

It is with great pride that I and the men and women who serve to protect this great city, present to you the Temple Police Department's 2018 Annual Report. The collection of individuals, both sworn and non-sworn who have joined together as the team that is your Temple Police Department, are some of the most committed, highly trained, caring and compassionate people you will ever come across. We are honored at the trust and authority you have bestowed upon us and will continue to strive each day to earn and exceed your greatest expectations.

As in past reports, you will find a great deal of information and statistical data on the current makeup of the City of Temple, its police department's budgetary allocations and reported crime. Temple police officers handled more than 116,500 total events (calls for service and self-initiated contacts) in 2018, this was an increase of more than 11,500 total events over the year 2017.

You will undoubtedly note that 2018 was a particularly challenging year for the City of Temple in violent crime. While the City experienced a 8% decrease in total crime reported, there was an 11% increase in the area of violent crime, particularly family violence related crimes. The patrol and investigative efforts of the men and women of this department, along with the resources of local, state and federal law enforcement agencies have resulted in bringing resolution to almost all the reported homicides of 2018.

As the City of Temple continues to grow, so does the size of it police department, both sworn and non-sworn positions. In 2018 the City's Animal Services Division was transferred under the management of the police department to streamline its continuity of services. The department also continued its efforts to civilianize several positions to include its crime scene processing and media relations responsibilities to put more police officers back on the streets. As 2019 begins, I and the members of your police department look forward to continuing to have meaningful interaction, community engagement and communication that strengthens our relationship.

The Field Services Bureau is the backbone of the police department, providing support to both Investigations and Administration.

Investigations

The Investigations Bureau includes two (2) divisions totaling 62 officers and 9 non-sworn members: Investigations and Special Operations. Investigations Division includes Violent, Special, and Property Crime Units, as well as the Special Investigations Unit and the Property, Evidence, and Crime Scene Unit. The Special Operations Division contains the Community Oriented Policing, School Resource, and Traffic Units in addition to the Violent Crime Enforcement Squad.

Administration

The Administration Bureau consists of 10 officers and 30 non-sworn members in the Administration Division and the Professional Standards Unit. Operations, Records, Community Service, and Animal Services are encompassed within the Administration Division. Internal Affairs, Public Relations, and Training fall within the Professional Standards Unit. The individuals in this bureau work mostly behind the scenes but play a vital role in the department's success.

PERSONNEL SUMMARY

As of October 1, 2018, the Temple Police Department was authorized 154 Law Enforcement Officers and 39.5 civilian staff members. These totals reflect the addition of Animal Services to our ranks.

Axon System

In 2018, the Department executed a five-year equipment and data storage agreement with Axon Enterprises, Inc. This agreement will result in the installation and use of an all new, state of the art in-car, body-worn and interview room digital recording system, along with unlimited Cloud storage for all digital evidence. This agreement also includes the issuance of a less lethal option, with every officer on the Department being assigned a conducted energy weapon (Taser). The Axon agreement will advance the Department's ability to capture, retain and categorize its digital evidence like never before.




Rifle Proof Vests








Violent Crime¹

Field Services

Field Services, also known as Patrol, is considered to be the "backbone" of any Police Department. These men and women are the first to respond to citizens' calls for assistance and crimes in progress.

Many significant events took place in 2018 that had Patrol showing exactly why they have gained this moniker. Patrol teams improved their average response time on Priority 1 calls by 36 seconds, even as the department saw an increase of 11,656 calls in 2018.

The department's four patrol teams are divided into day and night shifts. These officers routinely encounter hostile situations in order to keep their community safe.

Patrol teams take pride in their city and encourage residents to do the same. Officers

reached out to residents in the Jones Park neighborhood and set an example by helping citizens pick up trash and make the park a safer place.

The calls Patrol officers respond to daily give our Criminal Investigations Division the information they need to investigate crimes further. A routine traffic stop can quickly turn into a much larger investigation. Without the dedication of these men and women, much of the work done at the Temple Police Department would cease.

Criminal Investigations Division

The Criminal Investigations Division has many teams that focus on different crimes facing our community.

The **Criminal Investigations Division** plays a vital role in reducing crime. From a case investigation standpoint, the division addresses criminal wrong doing by gathering evidence, analyzing details, and executing strategic operations.

The **Violent Crimes Unit** focuses on crimes against persons. An increase in homicides and aggravated assaults defined much of this unit's work this year.

The **Special Crimes Unit** is responsible for crimes involving children. This includes children who are the victims of crimes, as well as instances where a juvenile is suspected of committing a crime. Missing persons, runaways, and curfew violations also fall to this unit.

The **Property Crime Unit** investigates property crime that includes burglaries, thefts, vandalism, financial crimes, and motor vehicle theft. The **Special Investigations Unit** is charged with the suppression of illegal possession, manufacture, and distribution of controlled substances along with protecting citizens from Human Trafficking.

Support Services

The Temple Police Department functions with the help of 39.5 non-sworn professionals.

Support Services provides and manages many of the resources that make the department function. Among the core responsibilities are the dissemination of information to the public and media outlets through press releases, social media, and records requests, the cataloging and storage of all evidence, and communicating with callers.

The **Records Unit** is responsible for assisting officers with all reports, supplemental materials, and the sex offender registry. The unit's personnel assist with requests for public copies of police reports which are often needed for insurance or record-keeping purposes.

Our **Community Service Technicians** are often the first line of communication for community members seeking assistance from our department. They are responsible for relaying necessary information to our officers in the field in a timely fashion.

The **Evidence Unit** is responsible for property storing and safeguarding evidence and recovered property, along with all found and relinquished items.

The **Professional Standards Unit** encompasses internal affairs, all training and recruiting, and public relations.

Services such as the **Quartermaster's Office**, the **Court Liaison**, and other full-time support staff also fall within this crucial category.

The City of Temple made an organizational change in June 2018. The Animal Shelter became part of the Temple Police Department. This change allowed the department to assign two detectives to investigate animal cruelty cases.

It also allows for more efficient communication between the department and animal services. As a result, both animal control officers and law enforcement officers can respond to calls throughout the city.

Animal Services provides a variety of benefits to our community, including rescuing animals in distress, reuniting lost pets with their owners, and responding to complaints

Through the work of our dedicated staff and faithful volunteers, we are striving to provide a safe, comfortable environment for the pets in our care and in the community.
