# City of Temple Deploys BridgeWave's Gigabit-Upgradeable Wireless Links to Deliver Voice, Data and Video Services



The city of Temple is a thriving metropolis in the heart of central Texas with one of the leading medical centers in the Southwest as well as home to large nationally recognized corporations, an acclaimed historic district and an array of public parks and recreational areas. Temple has gained recognition for its progressive adoption of innovative technologies to deliver public services, including online payment options for its 60,000 residents and a state-of-the-art mobile public safety communications system. Alan DeLoera, IT director for the city of Temple, and an experienced 18-

member team oversee the IT needs of 650 employees working at 32 buildings and facilities across a sprawling 70-square mile footprint. A data center located at city hall serves as the hub for computing and network operations.

While city hall and major facilities, including the police station, fire department, library, public works, court and fleet maintenance center, are connected via fiber optic links, the remaining sites initially were linked in a network star topology using an ad hoc combination of low-speed wireless, T1, ISDN, DSL and cable. For Brandon Harris, assistant IT director for the city of Temple, this patchwork quilt of bandwidth-constrained connectivity was incapable of supporting the city's migration to a converged, high-speed voice, data and video infrastructure.

We're poised to save hundreds of dollars in network deployment costs and access fees. Most importantly, this forward-looking solution protects our network infrastructure investments while ensuring Temple delivers superlative services to the city's employees, residents and businesses."

- Alan DeLoera IT Director City of Temple "We were eager to roll out additional e-government applications, deploy city-wide VoIP and video surveillance solutions, which meant we needed to upgrade our network substantially," he says.

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#### THE CHALLENGES

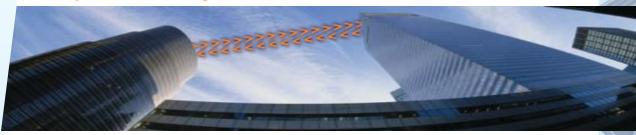
- Deliver voice, data and video connectivity to 32 city-wide locations.
- The city of Temple desired a robust yet cost-effective approach for scaling its network to accommodate ever-increasing applications.

"We weren't looking for a quick fix," recalls DeLoera. "Our overarching objective was to deploy a best-of-class wireless backbone that would support all our networking needs for the next decade, which meant being able to extend network capacity over time and pay for additional bandwidth as needed."

Deteriorating service availability: Temple needed to replace nine aging Proxim 5.8 GHz point-to-multipoint radios that had reached end-of-life and were increasingly unreliable. A robust, highly-available solution was required.

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- Network congestion and bandwidth limitations: Users frequently complained about slow application performance due to network congestion over limited-speed ISDN, DSL and cable modem connections.
- Lack of acceptable leased-line alternatives: Landline service was only available to 18 of the sites, and the cost of even limited 3-Mbps service to these sites was prohibitive at \$64,000 per year. The cost of running fiber to the sites was out of the question.

"The traditional landline solution was too costly and would only cover about half of our locations," notes Harris. "We really wanted a higher speed solution that would support every location, handle our evolving video requirements and deliver more bang for the buck."

#### THE SOLUTION

In exploring options for the network upgrade, Temple's IT team reviewed a variety of network access and backhaul technologies for connecting its dispersed sites and transporting traffic over a high-speed backbone. While some of the city's buildings were located in close proximity, others were miles apart and situated in rural areas. The team determined that Temple's 10 water towers, which formed a ring around the city, provided an excellent line-of-sight solution for reaching most locations.

Temple then enlisted the assistance of Redmoon Inc., a leading wireless solutions provider based in Plano, Texas, to offer technical guidance and installation support. Redmoon proposed an overall network solution based on integrating a high-capacity backbone using products from BridgeWave Communications with a 5.8 GHz mesh access system. They recommended BridgeWave's FE80U point-to-point wireless links, which provide full-rate 100 Mbps point-to-point backhaul capacity with software-key field upgradability to full Gigabit Ethernet capacity, when needed to support emerging applications.

"The narrow antenna beamwidth of BridgeWave's GigE and 100 Mbps links provide superior interference immunity while delivering enhanced data security," says Harris. "What's more, the highly scalable links were half the price we anticipated for this level of performance."

After discovering that BridgeWave was a viable backhaul solution, the city of Temple opted for a meshring network topology, which created a self-healing network with built-in redundancy for maximum service availability. The design called for installation of seven BridgeWave field-upgradeable, FE80U, 80 GHz, 100 Mbps point-to-point wireless bridges, which would be mounted on six water towers and city hall at link distances between 1.5 and 3.5 miles. These connections aggregate and backhaul traffic from the mesh access nodes as well as other applications to be rolled out in the coming months.

"We'd been building the network plan for a year, but it only took two weeks to make a decision on BridgeWave's 'future proof' backhaul technology," adds DeLoera. "We were really excited about the potential of the upgradeable BridgeWave products, both to support today's applications as well as ensuring support for future initiatives."

The city expects that its growing network traffic levels will lead to upgrading the 100 Mbps links to full GigE rates within the next few years.

Since the city of Temple experiences frequent torrential downpours and occasional tornados, weather was a lingering concern in deploying the wireless network. However, after working with Redmoon and BridgeWave to conduct rain-fade calculations, the IT team concluded that the BridgeWave solution would exceed Temple's requirement for "four nines" network availability. Additionally, it was determined that the ultra-low latency links met all necessary criteria for delivering low-latency, jitter-free voice and video transmissions.

#### THE BENEFITS

In September 2007, the city of Temple completed its high-speed, wireless network upgrade to meet current requirements while creating seemingly endless possibilities for the future.

"We have tons of flexibility to help city employees better serve their customers over an incredibly fast network," says Harris. "At the same time, we can accelerate a range of public safety, security and disaster recovery initiatives."

Employees in outlying areas, who once grappled with basic connectivity, are ecstatic over the ease and speed with which they can access, transmit and download city-wide data. In several of the outlying parks and recreational facilities, for instance, employees now can handle credit-card transactions for the first time. Meanwhile, Temple's IT team has developed a long list of applications to be deployed over the new network.

Topping the list are VoIP, unified messaging and video surveillance, which are being rolled out in various stages. Within the next six months, the city plans to extend VoIP and unified messaging to all city locations. In addition, a major effort to install video surveillance cameras on all city buildings and public works facilities is moving forward rapidly now that ample capacity is available.

"We're getting a jump on various public safety and security applications leveraging IP video surveillance," explains Harris. "We've started doing around-the-clock remote monitoring using multiple video cameras at the airport and plan to install video cameras on our water towers and water treatment plants as part of a Homeland Security requirement slated for 2009."

Additionally, Temple will begin migrating traffic from its previously separate, traffic signal monitoring, public safety and fresh water infrastructure monitoring applications onto the high-speed wireless network, improving connectivity and reducing network complexity. Other plans call for adding a series of Wi-Fi "hot zones" around the city to provide police, fire department and city employees with field access to city servers over the high-speed network. Since new network nodes can be quickly and easily deployed, the city also has identified an opportunity to set up temporary mobile data locations around the city as part of a far-reaching disaster recovery plan.

The city of Temple forecasts a complete ROI in less than three years on its new state-of-the-art wireless network. The overall cost savings also are quite compelling.

"We estimate saving \$100,000 annually by connecting our existing facilities over a wireless network," concludes DeLoera. "In the long run, we're poised to save hundreds of thousands of dollars in network deployment costs and access fees. Most importantly, this forward-looking solution protects our network infrastructure investments while ensuring Temple delivers superlative services to the city's employees, residents and businesses."

# **MARCH 5, 2009**

The City Council of the City of Temple, Texas conducted a Special Meeting on Thursday, March 5, 2009, at 3:00 PM in the 3rd Floor Conference Room, 2 North Main Street.

#### Present:

Councilmember Tony Jeter Councilmember Marty Janczak Mayor Pro Tem Patsy Luna Councilmember Russell Schneider Mayor William A. Jones, III

1. Discuss, as may be needed, Regular Meeting agenda items for the meeting posted for Thursday, March 5, 2009.

Item 4(O): Councilmember Jeter asked if competitive sealed proposals is the best method to obtain bids for the construction of the new fire station.

David Blackburn, City Manager, replied yes, that is staff's recommendation.

Councilmember Jeter stated he would like to include a policy statement in the bid documents regarding local preference. He asked that this policy be developed and brought back to Council for approval before proceeding with the project.

Item 5 (B) and (C): Councilmember Janczak asked if these redevelopment improvements support the objectives of the Temple Medical and Education District (TMED).

Kim Foutz, Assistant City Manager, replied the City is only supporting those improvements with matching funds that complement the TMED plans.

Mr. Blackburn explained the South 1st Street Corridor is the most active redevelopment corridor at this time. Staff is attempting to balance the TMED and SIZ objectives with the development that is occurring. We are not getting 100% compliance from the property owners but the plans that are underway are being considered.

Mayor Pro Tem Luna asked if there was a timeline for the VA Hospital to donate their property.

Mrs. Foutz explained there is no deadline at this point. The charette that was recently conducted allowed our partners to have a better idea of the outcomes desired.

- 2. Executive Session Chapter 551, Government Code, §551.087, the City Council will enter into executive session to discuss commercial and financial information regarding redevelopment proposals received for the Hawn Hotel and Arcadia. No final action will be taken.

Mayor Jones recognized Zoe Rascoe for receiving the Individual Citation Award from the Southwest Region of the National Parks and Recreation Association.

Ken Cicora, Director of Parks and Leisure Services, stated Zoe was nominated for this award by the Parks and Leisure Services Department. He read the criteria that had to be met in order for an individual to receive this award and highlighted her achievements submitted with the application.

Mayor Jones presented Tanya Gray, Executive Director, Keep Temple Beautiful, and Zoe Rascoe, with this proclamation in recognition of the 2009 Great American Cleanup.

Mayor Jones also presented a proclamation to Jackie Wernli in recognition of the 25th anniversary of the Relay for Life, taking place March 7-15, 2009.

#### III. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Dr. Paul Rothaus, 3006 Hickory Road, addressed the City Council regarding a continuing problem with speeding vehicles coming down Thornton Lane into the turn onto Hickory Road. The cars travel so fast as they make the turn that they leave the roadway and enter their yard, causing extensive damage. Dr. Rothaus stated he has spoken to the traffic department and they said they would install a traffic light at Midway Drive to resolve the problem. Now people speed up to try to make the light so that doesn't work. The City has also installed arrows to alert people of upcoming curves and these have been knocked down by vehicles. Dr. Rothaus asked the Council for help and protection for his family.

Bob Brown, 718 South 53rd, addressed the Council regarding kids who play with the portable basketball hoops in the streets. He suggested the City install some asphalt and poles for basketball nets in Marvin Fenn Park to give kids a safer place to play.

Councilmember Russell Schneider commended the Temple Police Department for their recent actions. He attended the funeral of retired Deputy Chief Bill Lange and it was with great pride that the department honored the memory and family of this fellow fallen officer.

Mrs. Foutz provided details about these projects and the improvements that will be made and showed photos of these properties. The matching grant for Pool's Grocery is up to \$23,877 based on an estimated \$60,365 investment by the property owner. The matching grant for Don's Medical is up to \$15,400 plus a fee waiver based on an estimated \$62,609 investment by the property owner.

**ITEM SUMMARY:** On March 10, 2009, the City received bids for plastic refuse containers. The bids are shown on the attached bid tabulation sheet.

The low bidder for the 95-gallon plastic containers was Otto Environmental of Charlotte, North Carolina. This vendor took exception to the bid specifications by submitting a bid using an injection molding process. The bidding documents specified rotational molded containers which, in our experience, produces a higher quality product consistent with the quality of container desired.

The second low bidder was Toter, Inc., of Statesville, North Carolina. Toter took one exception to the bid in the type of pin used for the lid. We find this exception to be equal or better than specified. In addition, the bid submitted is based on orders placed in lots of a truckload quantity, which consists of 636 containers. Even though the base bid was for 1,600 units, the bid allowed for the City to purchase additional units at the bid price. Based upon the bid price submitted, funding is available to order three full truckloads totaling 1,908 containers, and the extra quantity is needed by the department. Accordingly, the recommended award is for 1,908 containers at \$82,005.84 versus the quantity shown on the bid tabulation of 1,600 containers at \$68,768. The City has done business with Toter, Inc., and finds them to be a responsible vendor.

The low bidder for the 300 gallon containers was Rotonics Manufacturing, Inc., (RMI) of Brownwood, Texas. RMI took no exceptions to our bid specifications. The City has done business with RMI in the past and finds them to be a responsible vendor.

No exceptions were taken by Planet Ford on either of the two (2) bids. The City has done business with Planet Ford in the past and finds them to be a responsible vendor.

In accordance with the City's adopted Local Preference Policy, Council does have the option to award the two <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-ton full size pickups (Bid Tab #1) to Johnson Brothers Ford of Temple in the amount of \$43,411.16, versus the low bid of \$43,008 from Planet Ford, a \$403.16 spread. Johnson Brother's bid is within 1% of Planet Ford's low bid.

A third bid was also received for two (2) one-ton light duty pickups with special purpose bodies. Staff has concluded that the bid specifications for this third bid were unclear, and as a result, the bids were not comparable. Accordingly, staff is recommending that all bids be rejected on this particular vehicle and the vehicles be re-bid to eliminate the ambiguousness.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding for the purchase of the three vehicles is identified in the accounts as defined in the Item Summary above in the amount of \$76,885. Total funding needed for the purchases is \$67,393 resulting in a savings over budget in the amount of \$9,492.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> On May 1, 2008, the City authorized a contract with Wheeler Coating Asphalt, LP for asphalt overlaying of streets and the installation of speed humps in the City. The current contract will expire on March 31, 2009. The original bid allowed for four (4) additional one-year extensions. In order to renew the contract, the vendor must agree to hold their prices firm for an additional year, which they are willing to do.

Staff believes that the pricing under this contract is fair and reasonable based on the current market. Staff is pleased with the products provided by Wheeler Coating Asphalt, LP, and recommends Council authorize an extension to their contract. This will be the first one-year renewal authorized under this contract, with three remaining.

FISCAL IMPACT: Budgeted amount: \$470,000 in account 110-3400-531-2323

Unit price award amount: \$59.85 per ton for overlay; and \$80 per ton for speed humps.

**ITEM DESCRIPTION:** Consider adopting a resolution authorizing a contract with TCB Construction, Inc. of Austin for intersection improvements at Central Avenue and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street in the amount of \$108,365.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> This CIP project continues the intersection enhancement program that has occurred in the downtown area of Temple. This phase of the program will make improvements to the intersection at Central Avenue and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street.

Enhancements included in the base bid are the construction of 8 ADA compliant curb ramps, concrete sidewalk, pedestrian railing, curb and gutter, striped crosswalks, irrigation and landscaping, and ornamental lighting. Two alternates were included with this bid. Alternate #1 was requested to be added to this project by the Temple Area Builders Association and includes the addition of 2 decorative lights on Adams Avenue and 1 decorative light on 5<sup>th</sup> Street. Alternate #2 is the addition of 2 decorative lights on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street about mid-block between Central Avenue and Adams Avenue.

On March 3, 2009 bids were opened with 4 bidders responding with bids ranging from a low of \$121,640.00 to a high of \$158,778.50 for the base bid plus the two alternates. The Temple Area Builders Association is choosing not to pursue alternate #1 at this time. Staff recommends awarding the base bid and alternate #2 to TCB Construction in the amount of \$108,365.00 and rejecting alternate #1.

TCB Construction, Inc. has been found to be a responsive contractor and the Parks and Leisure Services Department has worked with them in the past.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** The cost of this construction contract is \$108,365.00. Funding in the amount of \$97,504 is available in account 361-3400-531-6833, project #100331 from the 2008 Certificate of Obligation Bond Issue. The remaining funds needed of \$10,861 are available from the Reinvestment Zone #1 in account 795-9500-531-6528, project #100331. The Reinvestment Zone #1 funds are part of the downtown improvement funds appropriated annually as part of the Zone's Financing Plan.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> On September 18, 2008 the City Council awarded a construction contract to Chaney-Cox Construction, Inc. for the construction of the Lions Junction Family Water Park in the amount of \$3,889,943.00. On December 18, 2008 the City Council approved change order #1 to this contract to upgrade the roof at the bath house and partitions in the changing rooms in the amount of \$38,642.00.

During construction of this project the Parks and Leisure Services Department hired a Concession Consultant to evaluate the different concession operations that the Department manages as well as the new concession operations that will be coming on line at the Lions Junction Family Water Park and the Summit Recreation and Fitness Center.

It is the recommendation of the Consultant that a larger area will be needed for the concession operation to reach the full potentials at the Water Park. The current design of the concession area is approximately 12' X 12'. It is possible to expand the area to approximately 12' X 24' for a modest cost. This larger area will allow for the storage and preparatory space needed to offer a more varied menu at the concession.

This additional space will allow the Parks and Leisure Services Department to better serve the patrons of the Water Park with more menu choices, generate more income than originally anticipated, and ensure revenues from concessions are maximized.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding in the amount of \$4,090,500 was appropriated in account 362-3500-552-6838, project #100356, for design and construction of this project from the 2008 General Obligation Bond Issue. An additional \$200,000 of funding was donated by the Temple Lions Club. After funding engineering-related services in the amount of \$333,200, construction administrative services in the amount of \$5,120, construction cost of \$3,928,585, and miscellaneous cost of \$15,459.21, a balance of \$8,135 remains available in this account to fund change order #2 in the amount of \$38,530.

Attached is a budget adjustment for Council's approval in the amount of \$30,395 appropriating interest earnings from the bond proceeds to fund the remaining cost for the expansion of the concession area. Total interest earned through 02/28/09 is \$81,520 leaving \$51,125 of interest earnings available to be allocated to the parks bond projects.

ITEM SUMMARY: On November 20, 2008, Vanguard Contractors, LP was awarded a construction contract for construction of and renovations to the new Municipal Court/Utility Business Office Facility. Based on the facility design and feedback from Municipal Court, Utility Billing, Purchasing, Finance and Architectural Edge, a technology plan was put forth to ensure telecommunications, data, security and computing needs were met in the new facility. The total cost of the Technology Plan is approximately \$330,000 with the video surveillance system, card access system, and the fiber and wireless infrastructure estimated to consume approximately \$175,000 budget. Other components of the budget estimated to cost less than \$25,000 each include cabling, telecommunications, audiovisual equipment, and other miscellaneous network and computer hardware costs.

It is staff's desire to use a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the procurement of the video surveillance system, the card access system, and the fiber and wireless infrastructure. In order to procure these contracts, staff would like to use RFPs to be able to consider evaluation criteria other than price in determining the best value for the City. In addition to price, staff would like to be able to evaluate the bids based on the proven experience and the reputation of each vendor, responsiveness based on the current construction timeline, and warranty and continued service offerings.

Although staff is recommending the use of an RFP process, these defined services are also available through previously competitively procured State of Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) contracts and through Federal Government General Services Administration (GSA) contracts. Historically we have purchased technology through these contracts because we believe that better pricing is achieved based on the impact of volume purchasing power through the participation of numerous agencies purchasing under these contracts. Accordingly, staff would like the flexibility to consider DIR and GSA contracts along with proposals received through the RFP process.

Staff will form a committee to evaluate the proposals and options available through DIR and GSA based on the evaluation criteria. It is staff's desire to advertise for proposals beginning March 22, 2009, with the anticipation of coming back to Council in May with recommendations for awards for each of these three (3) contracts.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT:</u> Funding for these technology needs are budgeted in the Courts Restricted Technology and Security funds which can only be used for these purposes along with Utility funds for the Utility Business Office's share of the costs.

It is staff's desire to negotiate a new three or four year lease for golf carts. In order to obtain the best value for the City under a new lease, it is staff's desire to use a Request for Proposals (RFP) to be able to consider evaluation criteria other than price in selecting the vendor for this contract. The recommended evaluation criteria in addition to price are as follows: reputation of the bidder, quality of the carts, warranty, and other offerings.

Staff will form a committee to evaluate the proposals based on the stated evaluation criteria. It is staff's desire to advertise for proposals for the golf carts beginning March 22, 2009, with the anticipation of coming back to Council in May, 2009, with a recommendation for award of a new lease agreement.

Per § 252.021 of the Local Government Code, before a municipality may enter into a contract that requires an expenditure of more than \$50,000, the municipality must comply with competitive sealed bidding procedures. However, the governing body of a municipality may consider using a method other than competitive sealed bidding in order to achieve the best value for the municipality.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There is no defined fiscal impact associated with this Item. Funding for leasing of the Sammons Golf Links golf carts is included in the adopted FY 2009 adopted budget in the annual amount of \$52,155 in account 110-3110-551-2615.

**ITEM DESCRIPTION:** Consider adopting a resolution directing staff to use an alternate method, as authorized in Resolution No. 2008-5492-R, to calculate all residential customers' winter water average for sewer charges to be billed from May 2009 through April 2010, due to the current drought conditions.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> Residential sewer charges are calculated based on water consumption during the months of December, January and February which are billed in the month following consumption. The water consumption average for those three months, which we refer to as "winter water average", is used to calculate the residential sewer charges beginning with the May bill. The residential sewer charge remains constant for the next twelve months. The residential water consumption during months of December, January, and February are used because those months are typically the lowest volume usage months during the year.

The Central Texas area has been experiencing severe drought conditions which have necessitated un-seasonal watering by residential water customers thus increasing residential water consumption in the months used to calculate the winter water average. Staff would like to consider using 2008 winter water averages instead of 2009 winter water averages for residential sewer charges during the billing periods of May 2009 through April 2010. By using the 2008 winter water averages, the residential sewer charges that customers are currently being billed would not change.

Customers wishing to use their 2009 average may request so in writing to the Utility Business Office. Customers will be notified on their May utility bills that they have the option to request this exception.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Based on average consumption of water for the current number of residential customers, the approximate impact to the City is \$140,000 for FY 2009. The average residential sewer customer would see an increase of approximately \$1.70 in their sewer bill if we choose to use the 2009 winter water average.

Whereas, due to this exceptional circumstance, the Staff recommends using an alternate method to calculate all residential customers' winter water average for sewer charges to be billed from May 2009 through April, 2010;

Whereas, the alternate method would be to not calculate the upcoming winter water average on the current year's consumption, but instead to use the prior years when the weather conditions were normal and customers did not have to water their yards during the winter months; and

**Whereas,** the City Council has considered the matter and deems it in the public interest to authorize this action.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Temple, Texas, That:

**PART 1:** The City Council authorizes the Staff to use an alternate method to calculate all residential customers' winter water average for sewer charges to be billed from May 2009 through April 2010 by using the calculations from the previous year.

**ITEM DESCRIPTION:** Consider adopting a resolution appointing election judges and setting their compensation for the City's special local option election to be held on May 9, 2009.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> This proposed resolution recommends the appointment of election judges and sets their compensation for the City's special local option election to be held Saturday, May 9, 2009.

On December 4, 2008, the City Council ordered a special local option election for voters to consider whether to allow the Temple Health and Bioscience Economic Development District to impose an ad valorem tax not to exceed 15 cents per \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the District and issue bonds payable in whole or part from the ad valorem tax. This election was ordered as a result of a petition being filed with the City, in accordance with Section 3831.254 of the Special District Local Laws Code.

The attached resolution recommends the appointment of election judges to serve at the City's four election day polling places and for the Early Voting Ballot Board. The compensation for election judges and clerks is recommended to be set at \$8.00 per hour in accordance with provisions in §32.091 of the Election Code. The election judge or clerk who delivers the precinct election records, keys to ballot boxes, and unused election supplies after an election is entitled to additional compensation for that service in an amount not to exceed \$25.

The election judge and members of the early voting ballot board are entitled to the same compensation as presiding election judges, in accordance with provisions in §87.005 of the Election Code. However, the minimum compensation to each member of the early voting ballot board is recommended to be \$50.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funds in the amount of \$10,000 are budgeted in account 110-1400-511-25-17, Election Expense, for the 2009 Special Local Option Election. Since this election is conducted on behalf of the Temple Health and Bioscience Economic Development District, as required by law, the District has agreed to pay their pro rata share of all election expenses. The City has also entered into a joint election agreement with Temple ISD for the May 9<sup>th</sup> election. However it appears the school district will be able to cancel their election since the incumbents have filed for re-election and are unopposed. Therefore, Temple ISD will not incur any costs for the election.

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> FIRST READING – PUBLIC HEARING - Z-FY-09-15: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages for onpremise consumption in a restaurant to be known as 'Kazam's Family Entertainment Center', located at 2001 West Adams Avenue on Tract 1, Albertson's Addition Replat.

**P&Z COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:** The Planning and Zoning Commission voted 8/0 to recommend approval of the Conditional Use Permit at its meeting on March 2, 2009 subject to Staff's recommended conditions. Commissioner Derek Martin abstained.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Staff recommends approval of the CUP with the following conditions in accordance with Zoning Ordinance, Section 7-611:

- 1. The permittee must design and operate the establishment in such a manner that the proposed use or actual use of the premises shall not substantially increase traffic congestion or create overcrowding in the establishment or the immediately surrounding area.
- 2. The permittee must comply with applicable licensing and permit provisions of the Alcoholic Beverage Code within 14 months from the date of the issuance of the conditional use permit by the City Council, such limitation in time being subject to review and possible extension by the City.
- 3. The permittee bears the burden of showing that the establishment does not exceed the limitation on gross receipts from sales of alcoholic beverages applicable to its conditional use permit. The permittee must maintain accounting records of the sources of its gross revenue and allow the City to inspect such records during reasonable business hours.
- 4. The permittee must demonstrate that the granting of the permit would not be detrimental to the public welfare of the citizens of the City.
- 5. The permittee must, at all times, provide an adequate number of employees for security purposes to adequately control the establishment premises to prevent incidents of drunkenness, disorderly conduct and raucous behavior. The permittee shall consult with the Chief of Police, who shall act in an advisory capacity to determine the number of qualified employees necessary to meet his obligations hereunder.
- 6. The establishment must provide adequate parking spaces to accommodate its members and their guests provided, however, the number of parking spaces shall never be less than those required for similar uses in that zoning district where the establishment is located.
- 7. The permittee must operate the establishment in such a manner as to prevent excessive noise, dirt, litter and odors in the establishment or in the surrounding area and operate the establishment in such a manner as to minimize disturbance to surrounding property owners.

- 8. The City Council may deny or revoke a conditional use permit if it affirmatively determines that the issuance of the same is (a) incompatible with the surrounding uses of property, or (2) detrimental or offensive to the neighborhood or contrary to the health, safety, and general welfare of the City and its inhabitants.
- 9. A conditional use permit issued under this section runs with the property. Changes in the owner or lessee of a permitted establishment do not affect the permit.
- 10. All conditional use permits issued under this section will be further conditioned that the same may be canceled, suspended or revoked in accordance with the revocation clause set forth in Section 7-608.
- 11. The applicant's site plan and application are exhibits to the conditional use permit.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> This CUP request is to allow the sale and on-premise consumption of alcoholic beverages in a future restaurant to be known as Kazam's Family Entertainment Center, located on Tract 1, Albertson's Addition Replat. The applicant states that sales of alcoholic beverages will total less than 75% of the gross sales of the restaurant.

The subject property is zoned Commercial (C) which permits on-premise alcoholic beverage sales or consumption in a restaurant with a CUP. This application is compatible with both existing and future surrounding land uses. This application also conforms to the Thoroughfare Plan. Adequate public facilities serve this site.

The distance from the requested CUP south to the property leased as a church exceeds the minimum distance requirements. The Zoning Ordinance states no conditional use permit may be granted if the establishment for which a permit is sought is within three hundred (300) feet of a church, public school or public hospital. The measurement of the distance between the business where alcoholic beverages are sold and the church or public hospital shall be along the property lines of the street fronts and from front door to front door, and in a direct line across intersections. (No intersection exists here.)

The distance from the door of the proposed CUP is 632± linear feet from the front door of the property leased as a church using the front door on South General Bruce as the beginning point for measurement. (For informational purposes, the distance from the front door of West Adams Avenue of the requested CUP and the residential area to the east measures 557± linear feet.) Both distances exceed the minimum distance.

The Zoning Ordinance, Section 7-611(b), places 10 conditions on CUPs allowing the on-premise consumption of beer or mixed drinks. The Staff Recommendation section lists these conditions. Condition #11 is based on Section 7-604 providing for the site plan and application to become part of the CUP.

Staff mailed 15 notices on February 20, 2009. As of March 9 at 5 PM, five notices were returned in favor and one notice in opposition of the request. The newspaper printed the legal notice of the public hearing on February 20, 2009 in accordance with state law and local ordinance

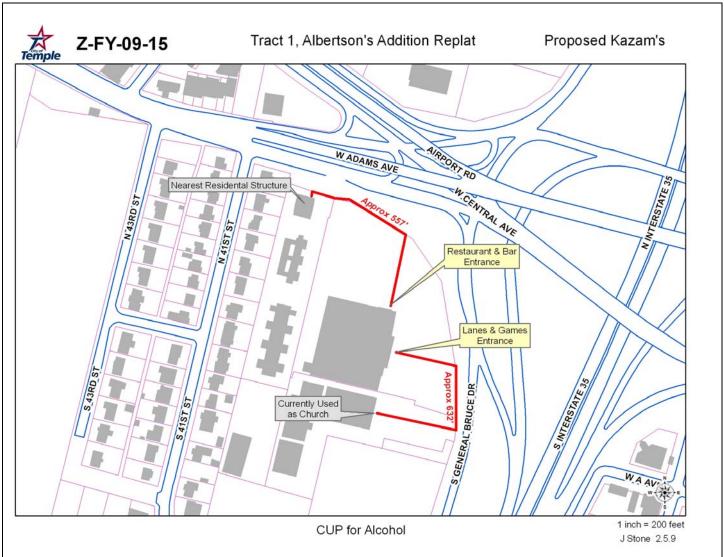

### **ACTION ITEMS**

**Z-FY-09-15:** Hold a public hearing to consider a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages for on-premise consumption in a restaurant to be known as Kazam's located at 2001 West Adams Avenue on Tract 1, Albertson's Addition Replat. (Applicant: David Kessler c/o David Kessler c/o Travis Associates, Whisper Capital LLC and Greyhawke Capital Advisors LLC).

Commissioner Martin abstained from this Action Item and left the room during the meeting and public hearing.

Mr. Tim Dolan, Planning Director, presented the background to the Commission and stated this is a proposed lot on the old Albertson's lot and involved on-premise sales for beer and mixed drinks. The Development Review Committee reviewed this site plan on February 16th and deemed it appropriate. Mr. Dolan stated that Conditional Use Permits (CUP) have certain needs in order to be considered, which includes but is not limited to:

Being compatible with nearby uses, would not impede any type of orderly development for the area, had adequate utilities, access, and drainage, safe and convenient movement of traffic, nuisance prevention measures are needed, directional lighting and sufficient landscaping and screening, would not substantially increase traffic from the area, would comply with the Alcoholic Beverage Code within 14 months of the CUP being issued, would not exceed limitation for gross receipts for the sales of alcoholic beverages, would not be detrimental to the welfare and provide adequate security, and adequate parking spaces to minimize any type of disturbance.

Mr. Dolan stated the CUP runs with the property, not with the user, and that City Council may revoke the CUP if it is found to be incompatible with surrounding uses or contrary to the health, safety, and general welfare of the general area.

Mr. Dolan stated 15 notices were mailed out for this permit with five (5) returned in agreement and one (1) in denial.

Mr. Dolan stated the Staff recommendation was to approve the CUP with the 11 conditions in the Zoning Ordinance; that it would not substantially increase traffic; it would comply with the Alcoholic Beverages Code within 14 months; it would not

exceed limitation on gross receipts for sales of alcoholic beverages and that gross revenue from on-premise sale of alcoholic beverages is less than 75% of the total gross revenue of the establishment; would not be detrimental to the public welfare; would provide adequate security; would provide adequate parking spaces; would minimize disturbances; and City Council can revoke the CUP if it is incompatible with any of the surrounding uses or contrary to the health, safety, and general welfare. The CUP runs with the property and may be canceled, suspended, or revoked if it does not occur within 14 months.

Chair Pope opened the public hearing to allow speakers the opportunity to comment on the item. Mr. David Kessler, developer, approached the Commission and stated he was in attendance in case he could answer any questions the Commission might have.

Commissioner Hurd asked about incoming and outgoing access of the area and Mr. Kessler stated the Department of Transportation currently had some plans under reviewed and there was a possibility on the entrance side to the parking lot that the curb cut may go away. If that occurred another curb cut would be requested to be put down further.

Commissioner Talley asked Mr. Kessler about the hours of operation from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. noted on Sundays, considering the proximity of the church. Mr. Kessler stated he had previously spoken with the Pastor and they agreed to work something out which would accommodate both parties.

There being no further speakers or discussion, Chair Pope closed the public hearing and entertained a motion. Commissioner Secrest made a motion to approve Z-FY-09-15 with the Staff recommendations and Commissioner Hurd made the second.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE, TEXAS, APPROVING A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT TO ALLOW THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES FOR ON-PREMISE CONSUMPTION WHERE THE GROSS REVENUE FROM THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IS LESS THAN 75% OF THE TOTAL GROSS REVENUE IN A RESTAURANT TO BE KNOWN AS "KAZAM'S FAMILY ENTERTAINMENT CENTER" LOCATED AT 2001 WEST ADAMS AVENUE ON TRACT 1, ALBERTSON'S ADDITION REPLAT; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING AN OPEN MEETINGS CLAUSE.

Whereas, the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance of the City of Temple, Texas, provides for the issuance of conditional use permits under certain conditions and authorizes the City Council to impose such developmental standards and safeguards as the conditions and locations indicate to be important to the welfare or protection of adjacent property and for the protection of adjacent property from excessive noise, vibration, dust, dirt, smoke, fumes, gas, odor, explosion, glare, offensive view or other undesirable or hazardous conditions, and for the establishment of conditions of operation, time limits, location, arrangement and construction for any use for which a permit is authorized;

**Whereas**, the Planning and Zoning Commission of the City of Temple, Texas, after due consideration of the location and zoning classification of the establishment, has recommended that the City Council approve this application; and

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Temple, Texas, after public notice as required by law, has at a public hearing, carefully considered all the evidence submitted concerning the establishment at 2001 West Adams Avenue, and has heard the comments and evidence presented by all persons supporting or opposing this matter at said public hearing, and after examining the location and the zoning classification of the establishment finds that the proposed use of the premises substantially complies with the comprehensive plan and the area plan adopted by the City Council.

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City of Temple, Texas, That:

<u>Part 1</u>: The City Council approves a Conditional Use Permit to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages for on-premise consumption where the gross revenue from the sale of alcoholic beverages is less than 75% of the total gross revenue in a restaurant to be known as "Kazam's Family Entertainment Center," located at 2001 West Adams on Tract 1, Albertson's Addition Replat, more fully described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof for all purposes.

<u>Part 2</u>: The owners/applicants, their employees, lessees, agents or representatives, hereinafter called "permittee" shall comply with the following developmental standards and conditions of operation:

- A. The sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages shall occur only within the designated area, in accordance with the site plan attached as Exhibit B.
- B. The permittee must design and operate the establishment in such a manner that the proposed use or actual use of the premises shall not substantially increase traffic congestion or create overcrowding in the establishment or the immediately surrounding area
- C. The permittee must comply with applicable licensing and permit provisions of the Alcoholic Beverage Code within six (6) months from the date of the issuance of the conditional use permit by the City Council, such limitation in time being subject to review and possible extension by the City.
- D. The permittee bears the burden of showing that the establishment does not exceed the limitation on gross receipts from sales of alcoholic beverages applicable to its conditional use permit. The permittee must maintain accounting records of the sources of its gross revenue and allow the City to inspect such records during reasonable business hours.
- E. The permittee must demonstrate that the granting of the permit would not be detrimental to the public welfare of the citizens of the City.
- F. The permittee must, at all times, provide an adequate number of employees for security purposes to adequately control the establishment premises to prevent incidents of drunkenness, disorderly conduct and raucous behavior. The permittee shall consult with the Chief of Police, who shall act in an advisory capacity to determine the number of qualified employees necessary to meet his obligations hereunder.
- G. The establishment must provide adequate parking spaces to accommodate its members and their guests. Provided, however, the number of parking spaces shall never be less than those required for similar uses in that zoning district where the establishment is located.

- H. The permittee must operate the establishment in such a manner as to prevent excessive noise, dirt, litter and odors in the establishment or in the surrounding area and operate the establishment in such a manner as to minimize disturbance to surrounding property owners.
- I. The City Council may deny or revoke a conditional use permit if it affirmatively determines that the issuance of the same is (a) incompatible with the surrounding uses of property, or (2) detrimental or offensive to the neighborhood or contrary to the health, safety, and general welfare of the City and its inhabitants.
- J. A conditional use permit issued under this section runs with the property and is not affected by a change in the owner or lessee of a permitted establishment.
- K. All conditional use permits issued under this section will be further conditioned that the same may be canceled, suspended or revoked in accordance with the revocation clause set forth in Section 7-609.

<u>Part 3</u>: The declarations, determinations and findings declared, made and found in the preamble of this ordinance are hereby adopted, restated and made a part of the operative provisions hereof.

<u>Part 4</u>: It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance are severable and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance should be declared invalid by the final judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of any such phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section.

<u>Part 5</u>: This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Temple, Texas, and it is accordingly so ordained.

<u>Part 6</u>: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act.

### **DEPT./DIVISION SUBMISSION & REVIEW:**

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> FIRST READING – PUBLIC HEARING – Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing the voluntary annexation of a 176.534 acre tract of land located in the vicinity of Airport Road and SH 317.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Conduct public hearing, adopt ordinance on first reading and schedule second reading and final adoption for April 2, 2009.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> Woods Robins Trust filed a petition on January 20, 2009, seeking voluntary annexation of approximately 192.831 acres into the City of Temple. Voluntary annexation is governed by Section 43.028 of the Texas Local Government Code and applies only to the annexation of an area that is: (1) less than one-half mile in width; (2) contiguous to the annexing municipality, and (3) vacant and without residents or on which fewer than three qualified voters reside. The landowner's petition meets the statutory requirements and is recommended to be granted.

The applicant seeking voluntary annexation proposes to use approximately 92.7 acres out of the annexed area as a quarry, and the proposed ordinance addresses this proposed use by applying Light Industrial (LI) zoning to 92.7 acres and the remaining approximately 100.131 acres as Agricultural (A) zoning. By separate ordinance, the Planning Department will ask the City Council to consider a conditional use permit for the 92.7 acre portion to allow a quarry operation.

Public hearings were conducted on February 19, 2009 (regular meeting) and February 20, 2009 (special meeting) and the proposed City services plan for the area under consideration for annexation. No public comments were received at either hearing.

**FISCAL IMPACT**: No immediate impact. Obligation to provide police and fire services. Some modest property tax revenue.

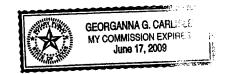

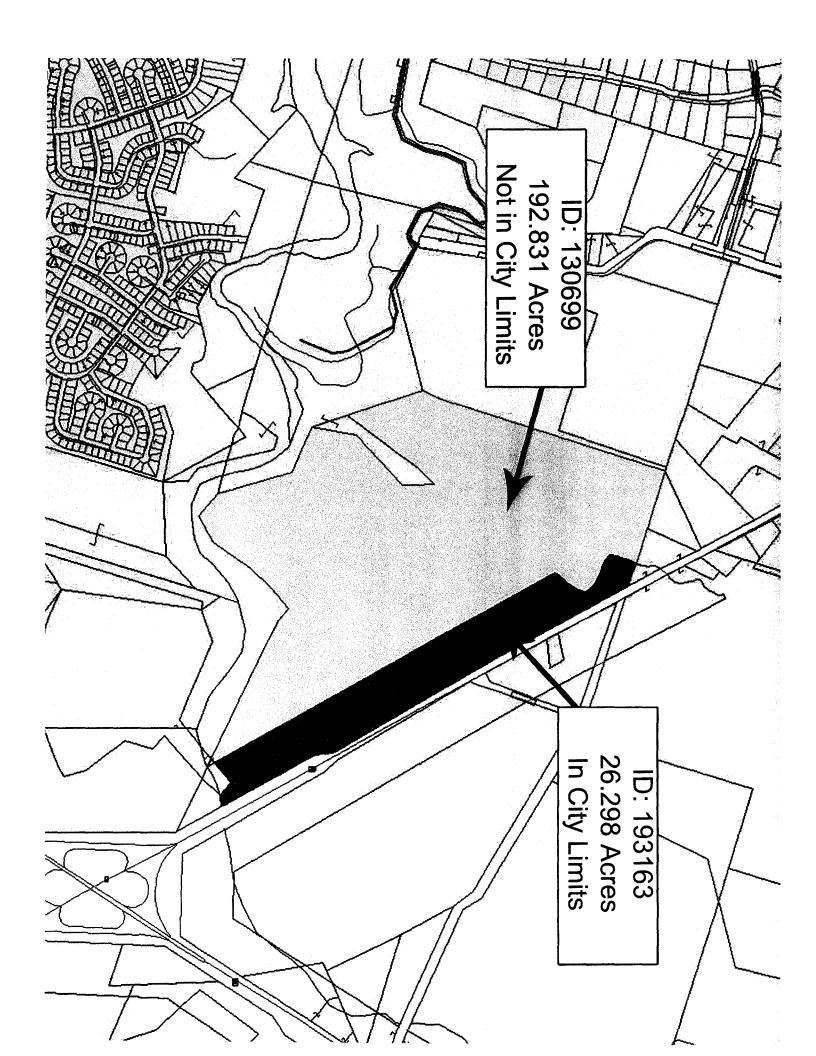

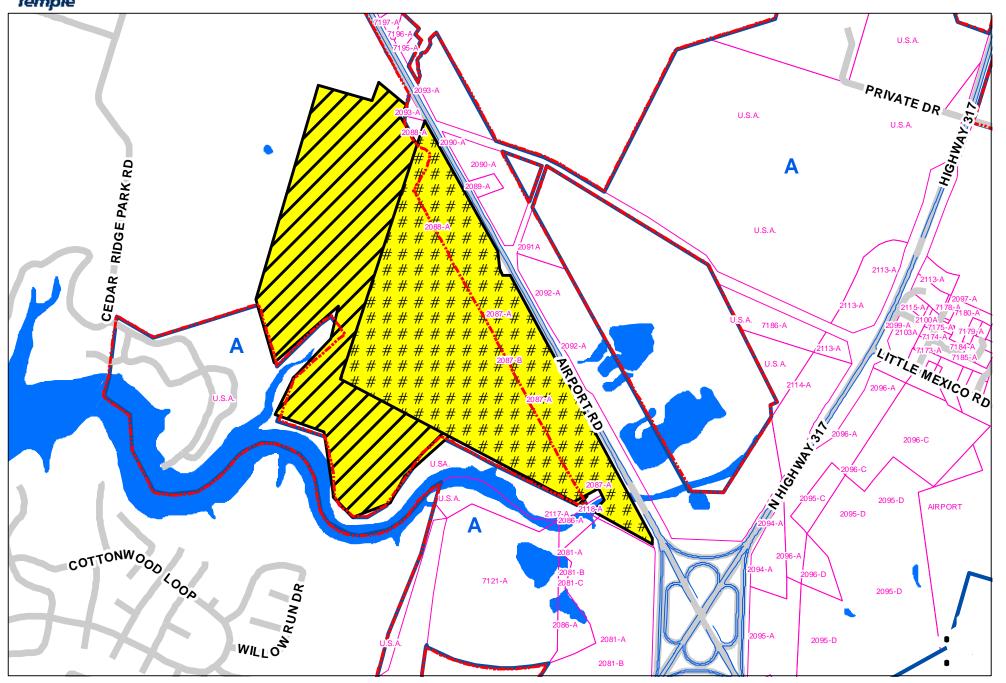

# CITY OF TEMPLE ANNEXATION SERVICE PLAN—VOLUNTARY ANNEXATION – WOODS ROBERT TRUST

For approximately 0.04 square miles situated in Bell County, Texas, located west and north of the current City limits in the proximity of Airport Road (SH 36), north of SH 317, and abutting the City limits, and being more particularly described an Exhibit "A" and depicted as Exhibit "B" of the Annexation Ordinance (2009-####).

### SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED ON THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF ANNEXATION

### POLICE PROTECTION

The City will provide protection to the newly-annexed tract at the same or similar of service now being provided to other areas of the City, with the same or similar topography, land use and population density.

### FIRE PROTECTION AND AMBULANCE SERVICE

The City will provide fire protection from Station 7 to the newly-annexed area at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City with the same or similar topography, land use and population density. The City will provide First Responder services through its Fire Department and contract for emergency medical services (EMS) through the Scott & White Hospital System.

### SOLID WASTE COLLECTION

Upon payment of any required deposits and the agreement to pay lawful service fees and charges, solid waste collection will be provided to citizens in the newly-annexed area to the extent that the City has access to the area to be serviced. Private contractors currently providing sanitation collecting services in the area may continue to do so for up to two years.

### 4. MAINTENANCE OF WATER AND WASTEWATER FACILITIES

Any and all water or wastewater facilities owned or maintained by the City at the time of the proposed annexation shall continue to be maintained by the City. Any and all water or wastewater facilities which may be acquired subsequent to the annexation of the proposed area shall be maintained by the City, to the extent of its ownership. Any and all water or wastewater facilities outside the extent of the ownership of the City, and owned by other water or wastewater providers shall continue to be allowed to provide those services to the newly-annexed tract.

### MAINTENANCE OF ROADS AND STREETS

Any and all public roads, streets or alleyways which have been dedicated to the City, or which are owned by the City, shall be maintained to the same degree and extent that other roads, streets and alleyways are maintained in areas with similar topography, land use and population density. Any and all lighting of roads, streets and alleyways which may be positioned in a right-of-way, roadway or utility company easement shall be maintained by the

applicable utility company servicing the City, pursuant to the rules, regulations and fees of such utility.

# 6. MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS AND SWIMMING POOLS

The City Council is not aware of the existence of any public parks, playgrounds or swimming pools now located in the area proposed for annexation. In the event any such parks, playgrounds or swimming pools do exist and are public facilities, the City, will maintain such areas to the same extent and degree that it maintains parks, playgrounds and swimming pools and other similar areas of the City now incorporated in the City.

# 7. MAINTENANCE OF MUNICIPALLY-OWNED FACILITY, BUILDING OR MUNICIPAL SERVICE

The City Council is not aware of the existence of any publicly-owned facility, building or other municipal service now located in the area proposed for annexation. In the event any such publicly-owned facility, building or municipal service does exist and are public facilities, the City will maintain such areas to the same extent and degree that it maintains publicly-owned facilities, buildings or municipal services of the City now incorporated in the City.

### 8. CONSTRUCTION SAFETY

The City will provide building inspection services upon approved building permits from the City to the newly-annexed tract at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City with the same or similar topography, land use and population density.

### 9. CODE ENFORCEMENT

The City will provide code enforcement services to the newly-annexed tract at the same or similar level of service now being provided to other areas of the City with the same or similar topography, land use and population density.

### **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS**

### POLICE PROTECTION, FIRE PROTECTION AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The City Council finds and determines it to be unnecessary to acquire or construct any capital improvements for the purposes of providing police protection, fire protection, or emergency medical services. The City Council finds and determines that it has at the present time adequate facilities to provide the same type, kind and level of protection and service which is presently being administered to other areas already incorporated in the City with the same or similar topography, land use and population density.

### 2. ROADS AND STREETS

The City will undertake to provide the same degree of road and street lighting as is provided in areas of the same or similar topography, land use and population density within the present corporate limits of the City. Maintenance of properly dedicated roads and streets will be consistent with the maintenance provided by the City to other roads and streets in

areas of similar topography, land use and sub development of the annexed property. Developers will be required, pursuant to the ordinances of the City to provide internal and peripheral streets and to construct those streets in accordance with the specifications required by the City for the properly dedicated street. City participation in capital expenditures will be in accordance with city policies.

### 3. WATER AND WASTEWATER FACILITIES

The City of Temple has no water facilities within the boundaries of the voluntary annexation which is served by a rural water corporation, Moffat WSC. In areas served by a rural water supply corporation, which is providing service meeting state standards, no extension of City of Temple water service is planned, and the rural water supply corporation will continue to provide water service.

In areas not served by a rural water supply corporation, the City of Temple proposes no extension of water facilities to the area, taking into consideration existing service providers, the existing land use, and topography and population density relative to areas within the existing City Limits which do not have water services.

The City of Temple has no wastewater providers within the boundaries of the voluntary annexation and property owners rely on septic tank systems. The City of Temple proposes non extensions of wastewater facilities to the boundaries of the voluntary annexation taking into consideration existing service providers, the existing land use, and topography and population density relative to areas within the existing City Limits which do not have water services.

### 4. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Notwithstanding any other provision of this service plan, a landowner within the newly annexed area will not be required to fund capital improvements as necessary for municipal services in a manner inconsistent with Chapter 395 of the Local Government Code, unless otherwise agreed to by the landowner.

### **SPECIFIC FINDINGS**

The City Council finds and determines that this proposed Service Plan will not provide any fewer services, and it will not provide a lower level of service in the area proposed to be annexed than were in existence in the proposed area at the time immediately preceding the annexation process.

Because of the differing characteristics of topography, land utilization and population density, the service levels which may ultimately be provided in the newly annexed area may differ somewhat from services provided in other areas of the City. These differences are specifically dictated because of differing characteristics of the property and the City will undertake to perform consistent with this contract so as to provide the newly-annexed area with the same type, kind and quality of service presently enjoyed by the citizens of the City who reside in areas of the same or similar topography, land utilization and population density.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE, TEXAS, ANNEXING ADJACENT AND CONTIGUOUS TERRITORY CONSISTING OF A 176.534 ACRE TRACT OF LAND IN THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF THE INTERSECTION OF SH 317 AND SH 36 (AIRPORT ROAD) AND APPROVING A SERVICE PLAN FOR THIS TRACT PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED; FINDING THAT ALL NECESSARY AND REQUIRED LEGAL CONDITIONS HAVE BEEN SATISFIED; PROVIDING THAT SUCH AREA SHALL BECOME A PART OF THE CITY AND THAT THE OWNERS AND INHABITANTS THEREOF, IF ANY, SHALL BE ENTITLED TO THE RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF OTHER CITIZENS AND BE BOUND BY THE ACTS AND ORDINANCES NOW IN EFFECT AND TO BE HEREAFTER ADOPTED; PROVIDING A ZONING CLASSIFICATION FOR SAID PROPERTY PROVIDING AS SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING AN OPEN MEETINGS CLAUSE.

Whereas, the City of Temple is a home-rule city authorized by State law and the City Charter to annex territory lying adjacent and contiguous to the City, or potions of property currently subject to a development agreement within the City's ETJ;

**Whereas**, two separate public hearings where conducted prior to consideration of this ordinance in accordance with Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code;

Whereas, the hearings were conducted and held not more than forty nor less than twenty days prior to the institution of annexation proceedings;

**Whereas**, notice of the public hearings was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City and the territory proposed to be annexed not more than twenty nor less than ten days prior to the public hearings;

**Whereas**, the property to be annexed is contiguous with and adjacent to the City and not within the boundaries of any other city;

Whereas, there are no dwelling units within the area to be annexed, and no inhabitants; and

**Whereas**, the City is able to provide all services to the property to be annexed according to the service plan attached hereto.

Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Temple, Texas, That:

- **Part 1**: All of the above premises are found to be true and correct and are incorporated into the body of this ordinance as if copied in their entirety.
- <u>Part 2</u>: The property consisting of 176.534 acres described in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes (hereinafter referred to as the "Property"), is hereby annexed and brought within the corporate limits of the City of Temple, Bell County, Texas, and is made an integral part thereof, in accordance with the request in the *Petition for Annexation* accepted by the City of Temple, Texas, attached hereto and made a part hereof for all purposes as Exhibit "B."
- <u>Part 3</u>: The service plan submitted in accordance with Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code is hereby approved as part of this ordinance, made a part hereof and attached hereto as Exhibit "C."
- <u>Part 4</u>: The owners and inhabitants of the Property herein annexed shall be entitled to all of the rights and privileges of other citizens and property owners of said City and are hereby bound by all acts, ordinances, and all other legal action now in full force and effect and all those which may be hereafter adopted.
- <u>Part 5</u>: The official map and boundaries of the City of Temple, heretofore adopted and amended be and hereby amended so as to include the annexed Property as part of the City of Temple.
- <u>Part 6</u>: The annexed Property shall, in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Temple, be zoned as "A," *Agricultural District*, and "LI" *Light Industrial* as shown on the map made a part hereof and attached hereto as Exhibit "D."
- <u>Part 7</u>: The annexed Property shall be included in, and become a part of, the City of Temple City Council Election District Number 4.
- <u>Part 8</u>: If any provision of this ordinance or the application of any provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.
- Part 9: If the taking of any territory annexed by this ordinance is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid and/or illegal, it shall not affect the balance of the property annexed and attempted to be annexed, and that property shall remain as part of the City of Temple, Texas. It is the intent of this ordinance that any territory that is not lawful for the City to incorporate be excluded from this annexation and that such exclusion be documented by having a qualified surveyor correct the property description of the annexed area to conform to the Council's intention and to insure that the boundary description closes.
- <u>Part 10</u>: This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Temple, Texas, and it is accordingly so ordained.

<u>Part 11</u>: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act.
