# **TEMPLE CITY COUNCIL**

### **JANUARY 3, 2013**

The City Council of the City of Temple, Texas conducted a Special Meeting on Thursday, January 3, 2013 at 3:30 PM, at the Municipal Building, 2 North Main Street, in the 3rd Floor Conference Room.

#### Present:

Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn Councilmember Russell Schneider Councilmember Judy Morales Mayor William A. Jones, III

#### Absent:

1. Discuss, as may be needed, Regular Meeting agenda items for the meeting posted for Thursday, January 3, 2013.

Regular Agenda Item #4 - Zoning Case Z-FY-13-01: Councimember Schneider stated he would like to see the entire area zoned properly verses piece milling. He asked when it was annexed.

Ms. Speer stated in 1997. She explained the applicant submitted a request for a building permit; of which was denied due to the side yard set back requirements.

Mr. Blackburn stated it is common practice for us to annex as AG, which is th most restrictive zoning. He committed to Council to review all recently annexed areas and the zoning.

Regular Agenda Item #5 & #6 - Zoning Case related to signs: Councilmember Morales requested to have visual for the location of these signs.

Regular Agenda Item #10 - Board Appointment/ Chair of RZ No. 1.

2. Discuss zoning for institutions for alcoholic and narcotic patients.

Ms. Speer stated the Centex Alcohol Rehabilitation Center began in 1972 and was originally located at the 2500 South General Bruce Drive. The Center is a 501 c3 non-profit and is classified as a community corrections facility of which the State provides standards for maintenance, operation, and level of security appropriate for the population served. Currently there

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are 75 residential clients perm month at the Center; and 100 outpatient clients. The Center is requesting to relocate from ther current location to South 50th and East Adams due to the TxDOT and I-35 Expansion. The proposed location is zoned Commercial which by right allows for 'Institution for Alcoholic or narcotic patients'. Ms. Speer stated that all legal notices have been met by the Center to relocate to the prooposed location as well as complying with all other requirements under the state law. At this time there are no additional requirements for the City. Ms. Speer noted, the public meeting to be held on January 4th, will determine if the project continues or not. This decision is made by the state.

Councilmember Morales stated she wants to provide help for the community, but also wants to listen to the concerns of those within the community on this particular issue. She also asked Mr. Jim Cooper about the proximaty to Hector P. Garcia and if the Center would be locked.

Mr. Cooper stated no, the residents are free to leave with a pass from the counselor. Most of the residents are non-violent offenders attempting to transition back into the community. East Adams location has minimum foot traffic by students in the area. Mr. Cooper stated this a \$2 million dollar facility and will create 28 jobs. He also noted that TxDOT's 'out-date' is August 1, 2013.

Mayor Pro Tem Dunn also inquired on discipline is there is misbehavior by the residents.

Mr. Cooper stated it depends on the incident or infraction. There are rules and policies in place that sets out consequences; and these are enforced.

Councilmember Cloud asked if there were safe guards in place to keep residents from leaving?

Mr. Cooper stated no, but if they leave without permission they will have consequenses with parole or probation officer as well as the judge.

Ms. Speer stated that over 2 years, there have been 47 calls for service; 5 of which were disturbances.

Chief Smith also commented that at the current location, the Center is not a high consumer of services.

Mr. Cooper asked for Council to consider this request.

# 3. Receive a City Council continuing education briefing on the City Charter.

Mr. Graham, City Attorney provided an overview of the City's Charter. He noted this is another term for constitution. Mr. Graham also noted that the

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City of Temple is a 'home rule' city. He provided an overview of some of the articles within the Charter to include Articles 3, 4, 7, & 8.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mr. Ricky Lewis, 305 Ben Nevis Lane was present to discuss item #4. Mayor Jones advise Mr. Lewis this item (item 4) was posted on the agenda for a public hearing. Mr. Lewis indicated he would wait.

#### III. CONSENT AGENDA

- 3. Consider adopting a resolution approving the Consent Agenda items and the appropriate resolutions for each of the following:
  - (A) 2013-6854-R: Consider adopting a resolution authorizing an annual service agreement with Magna Flow Environmental of Humble for hauling and disposal of membrane CIP waste for FY 2013 for \$.07/gallon in the estimated annual amount of \$28,000.
  - (B) 2013-6855-R: Consider adopting a resolution authorizing a Chapter 380 Strategic Investment Zone "matching grant"

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agreement with Ponderosa Food Service Company Inc. for redevelopment improvements to the existing Presidia building located within the MLK Jr. Boulevard Strategic Investment Zone corridor at 306 East Adams in an amount not to exceed \$44,000 plus waiver of permit fees.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn adopt Resolution approving Consent Agenda. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Motion passed unanimously.

#### IV. REGULAR AGENDA

#### **ORDINANCES**

4. 2013-4571: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING - Z-FY-13-01: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a permanent zoning from Agricultural District (AG) to Planned Development-Single Family One District (PD-SF-1) at 305 Ben Nevis Lane, located on Lot 4, Block 1, The Highlands Phase 1.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. She stated the applicant is requesting the rezoning from AG to PD-SF1 to allow for a reduced side yard setback at the south property line of the residence. This property was annexed into the City Limits in 1997; the property was platted prior to this annexation and had deed restriction allowing the 5 foot yard setback. The applicant was not aware of the specifics for the agricultural zoning. A building permit was submitted a few months ago and was denied. The applicant then began the process through Planning and Zoning Commission. Ms. Speer stated the shortest route was to allow for the setback through the Zoning Board of Adjustment; and it was denied yet again. Staff then recommended the planned development for Single Family One. The Single Family One zoning does comply and follow our comprehensive plan and Land Use Plan for this area. Ms. Speer provided photos the subject and surrounding of properties. She also noted the applicant has met all the requirements with the exception of the side yard setback; the planned development proposal would allow the 5'-6' side yard setback on the south property line. Ms. Speer provided drawings for the proposed addition to the home. It is proposed to be mason exterior on the front and hardy on the side matching the property as it is now. Ms. Speer stated there were 13 notices mailed out to the surrounding properties; four were City Council Page 5 of 9

returned in favor and three in opposition. Mr. Lewis provided a letter rescinding his opposition; it is was provided to each Councilmember at the dias. Staff recommends approval of the request. Planning and Zoning heard this case on December 17, 2013 with a vote of 9/0 recommended approval of the zoning change as submitted.

Mayor Jones asked, if the house burned down could it be rebuilt as it's zoned AG?

Ms. Speer replied yes.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda item 4 and asked if anyone wished to address this item. There being no comments, Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing closed.

Councilmember Schneider stated he wished this had been done differently so that the entire neighborhood had the proper zoning. In fairness to the applicant he didn't see any reason to not approve this request.

Mayor Jones stated we have committment from staff and City Manager to initiate the process in seeing that all the annexed areas are zoned properly.

Motion by Councilmember Russell Schneider adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for January 17, 2013. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Motion passed unanimously.

5. 2013-4572: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING - Z-FY-13-02: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a Conditional Use Permit to allow an off-premise sign relocation closer than 1,500 feet from another off-premise sign at 3010 South General Bruce Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. The currently location of this sign is at 2914 South General Bruce Drive and is proposed to move to 3010 South General Bruce Drive. The Unified Development Code allows for relocation due to TxDOT right-of-way acquistion; but there are spacing requirements that if not meet it must be reviewed by Council. All standards have been met with the exception of the spacing requirements. Ms. Speer stated there were six notice mailed to the surrounding property

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owners; with zero responses. Staff's recommendation is to approve the CUP. The Planning and Zoning Commission heard this case on December 17, 2012 and recommended approval of this CUP by 9/0.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda item 5 and asked if anyone wished to address this item. There being no comments, Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing closed.

Motion by Councilmember Judy Morales adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for January 17, 2013. seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn.

Motion passed unanimously.

6. 2013-4573: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING - Z-FY-13-03: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a Conditional Use Permit to allow an off-premise sign relocation closer than 1,500 feet from another off-premise sign at 2502 North General Bruce Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. The currently location of this sign is in front of Kork's Liquor Store on General Bruce and is proposed to move to 2502 North General Bruce Drive. The Unified Development Code allows for relocation due to TxDOT right-of-way acquistion; but there are spacing requirements that if not meet it must be reviewed by Council. All standards have been met with the exception of the spacing requirements. Ms. Speer stated there were three notices mailed to the surrounding property owners; with two returned in favor of relocating. Staff's recommendation is to approve the CUP. The Planning and Zoning Commission heard this case on December 17, 2012 and recommended approval of this CUP by 9/0.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda item 6 and asked if anyone wished to address this item. There being no comments, Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing closed.

Motion by Councilmember Russell Schneider adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for January 17, 2013. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Motion passed unanimously.

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7. 2013-4574: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING - Z-FY-13-04: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a zone change from Agricultural District (AG) to Single Family Three District (SF-3) on 64.073 ± acres and Office Two District (O-2) on 9.665 ± acres, situated in the Nancy Chance Survey, Abstract No. 5, Bell County, Texas, located on the west side of Old Waco Road, adjacent to Westwood Estates and Hills of Westwood, south of Jupiter Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. This is a request for combination zoning for single family three and office two. Ms. Speer provided aerials of the tracts; she stated the surrounding properties are undeveloped rural-residential primarily to the south and east. She reviewed the uses standards for both SF-3 and O-2. The Comprehensive Land Use Plan designates Old Waco Road as suburban commercial; therefore the O2 portion of the site meets the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Should this request be approved by Council, we'll need to come back with a Comprehensive Land Use Plan amendment later in the year. Staff sent our 23 notice with one response returned in opposition. Staff recommends approval of both the requests to SF-3 and O-2 as they comply with the Thoroughfare Plan and public utilities will be available to the property. The Planning and Zoning Commission heard this request on December 17. 2012 and recommended approval of both zoning changes with a vote of 9/0.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda item 7 and asked if anyone wished to address this item. There being no comments, Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing closed.

Councilmember Schneider stated he spoke with the applicant and duplexes is not the intent for this request.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for January 17, 2013. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Motion passed unanimously.

#### RESOLUTIONS

8. 2013-6856-R: Z-FY-13-05: Consider adopting a resolution authorizing an Appeal of Standards in Sec. 6.7 of the

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Unified Development Code related to the I-35 Corridor Overlay Zoning District for landscaping and parking improvements for Texas Roadhouse, located at 624 North General Bruce Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. Ms. Speer stated the applicant, Texas Roadhouse, wishes to relocate some of their parking to the rear of the building due to TxDOT acquisition. This will trigger some of the I-35 Overlay Standards; primarily the landscaping. They have met majority of the Standards and provided mitigation for those not met with the exception of parking location and lighting. Staff recommends approval of all the appeals as submitted. This was heard by the Planning and Zoning Commission and was recommended with a vote of 9/0 in favor of approval.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn adopt Resolution. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Motion passed unanimously.

9. 2013-6857-R: Z-FY-13-06: Consider adopting a resolution authorizing an Appeal of Standards in Sec. 6.7 of the Unified Development Code related to the I-35 Corridor Overlay Zoning District for landscaping and building improvements for Johnson Brothers Ford located at 503 and 615 North General Bruce Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to the Council. Ms. Speer stated the applicant, Johnson Brothers Ford, wishes to add a 2,100 sq foot metal addition to the body shop. This will trigger some of the I-35 Overlay Standards due to assessed value of the property. They have met majority of the Standards and provided mitigation for those not met with the exception of the architectural standards. They are requesting that it be the same metal as the existing building. Staff recommends approval of all the appeals as submitted; however it is recommended that this not be final appeal. Any future improvements to this site, that trigger the I-35 Overlay District Standards, would require renegotiation and approval. This was heard by the Planning and Zoning Commission on December 17, 2013, and was recommended approval with a vote of 9/0.

Motion by Councilmember Russell Schneider adopt Resolution. seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn.

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Motion passed unanimously.

Chief Gary Smith voiced the Invocation.

#### 2. Pledge of Allegiance

Randy Stoneroad, Director of Human Resources/Civil Service, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mr. Adam Soorholtz, 208 Richland, Temple thanked the City Council for their participation in the Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Temple program.

Chief Gary Smith provided a brief overview of the 2012 report to Council. He reviewed the data regarding the number of traffic stops, citations and arrests issued during 2012 by the Temple Police Department. This data was based on the U.S. Census Bureau. He noted that data in this report relates to race known prior to stop for citations, arrests, citations with search, citations with search by consent, motor vehicle stops leading to arrests, and arrest and search. Chief Smith concluded with how the Temple Police Department operates in a fair and consistent manner with the diversity within the City's population.

She also commented on General Fund Expenditures being 25% of budget or \$15.1 million. Sales tax at 1/31/2013 was greater than budgeted by 5.38%. Ms. Barnard stated the both Water Wastewater Revenues are at 25% of the total operating budget or \$7.2 million; and Expeditures being 24% of budget or \$6 million.

Mayor Jones thanked the City Staff for their dedicated work.

#### **ORDINANCES**

5. 2013-4577: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING: Consider adopting an ordinance adopting the Temple Youths' Program Standards of Care.

Ken Cicora, Director of Parks and Leisure Services, presented this item to Council. Mr. Cicora stated that in August 2004, the

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Council first adopted the Standards of Care for the youth programs sponsored by the Parks and Leisure Services Department. This is regulated by the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services and they require the standards to be presented at a public meeting and adopted by Ordinance each year. Mr. Cicora reviewed the key elements of the policy to include, defining a participate (5-13 years of age) and determining eligibility; criminal background checks for employees; first aid training; and orientation to name a few. He continued with the 2012 Report, noting that afterschool programs were provided at 4 TISD schools, 3 BISD schools, and St. Mary's School. The average attendance was 283 in 2011 and 297 for 2012. He noted that the summer camp attendance in 2012 declined slightly from 527 to 401.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda Item 5 and asked if anyone wished to address this item. There being none, Mayor Jones delcared the Public Hearing closed.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for March 7, 2013. seconded by Councilmember Perry Cloud.

Motion passed unanimously.

# 6. 2013-4578: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING: Consider adopting an ordinance re-establishing a curfew for minors.

Chief Gary Smith presented this item to Council. He stated that without Council's action the current ordinance will expire on March 18, 2013. This ordinance must be reviewed every three years to make any necessary changes if desired. The ordinance covers Sunday through Thursday 11:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m. the following day; and Saturday and Sunday (Friday and Saturday night) 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. It covers any person under the age of 17; parents and guardians that knowingly permit or fails to control a minor and allows the curfew to be violated; as well as business operator that knowingly allows a minor to remain on premises during curfew. Chief Smith reviewed the defenses to arrest and or prosecution. He explained this curfew is to provide for crime prevention within our City. In 2010 there were 111 violations; 2011, 190 violations; and in 2012, 147 total violations.

Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda Item 6 and asked if anyone wished to address this item.

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There being none, Mayor Jones delcared the Public Hearing closed.

Motion by Councilmember Judy Morales adopt Ordinance, with second and final reading set for March 7, 2013. seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn.

Motion passed unanimously.

#### **RESOLUTIONS**

7. 2013-6891-R: Z-FY-13-11: Consider adopting a resolution authorizing an Appeal of Standards in Sec. 6.7 of the Unified Development Code related to the I-35 Corridor Overlay Zoning District for landscaping, parking, signs and architectural standards, for Garlyn Shelton Car Dealership at the SE corner of Midway Drive and South General Bruce Drive.

Autumn Speer, Director of Planning and Development, presented this case to Council. Ms. Speer stated the applicant is Larry Neal on behalf of G.S. Diamond S. Holdings, LP. This is for new construction of a 22,000 square foot facility and 30,000 square foot facility for care sales and services. The site is a total of 9.4 acres; and they are requesting an appeal for the parking, landscaping, signs, and architecture. Ms. Speer stated the triggers and applicability for the new construction is 100%. She also provided a summary of standards which have been met by the applicant to be, submitted site plan; parking curb and gutter provided; storage restrictions; screening and wall standards; irrigation for landscaped areas; and lighting. Ms. Speer then reviewed each appeal being requested by the applicant. She stated that Staff's recommendation is to approve all appeals as submitted with the following additions, (1) additional displays not be permitted in the proposed Midway ROW area; (2) additional planting of 6 canopy trees in the I-35 buffer area; 10 ornamental trees along Shallow Ford Road in the detention area; (3) 20% of the landscape buffer areas must have native grass beds or wildflowers in all areas; (4) provide parking screen via hedge row 2.5' to 4' high for all parking areas visible from public view; (5) two canopy tree be provided in each of the six islands along I-35 frontage and two ornamental trees are planted in each of the other; (6) a minimum 6' wide sidewalk is constructed with the development along Midway Drive to meet minimum standards; and (7) I-35 sign requirements be met as they relate to number, height, and base materials. Staff also recommends that all future

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new construction will need to be compliant with the I-35 standards, however Staff recommends that these appeals be granted in perpetuity and not be subject to renegotiation should these standards be triggered again with future development. The Planning and Zoning Commission heard this case and recommends the additional items set forth by Staff to include addition #1, #2 with exception of 2 Canopy trees verses 6, #3, and #6. The Commission also recommends that the sign appeals come back to Council the second meeting in February as a separate appeal.

Mayor Pro Tem Dunn stated cars and trees don't make sense for this type of business; and feels the applicant has been very accommodating.

Ms. Speer stated the idea is to treat the front of the property and not screen the use, but to soften through landscaping.

Mayor Pro Tem Dunn stated that he has concerns with the requirements for landscaping. This is a high visibility are and that is why the applicant has choosen it.

Mr. Larry Neal, 4720 Ascott Parkway spoke on behalf of the applicant. He stated this is a car dealership and the applicant doesn't want to screen the merchandise. Mr. Neal stated we have tried to meet the needs of the ordinance. Mr. Neal requested support from the council to approve as submitted by the applicant with the addition of the 2 canopy trees at the front entrance; no trees in the islands; no screening; and 10 ornamental trees in the detention area.

Mayor Pro Tem Dunn recommended approval as submitted by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Councilmember Cloud abstained.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Danny Dunn adopt Resolution. seconded by Councilmember Judy Morales.

Councilmember Perry Cloud abstained. The other Councilmembers voted aye. The motion passed.

Ms. Speer stated the applicant requested the rezoning to allow placement of an off-premise sign; the current zoning does not permit this use. She provided photographs from surrounding properties. The City's Comprehensive Plan designates this area for Auto-Urban Commercial which allows for commercial uses; this is the

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dominant development pattern along HK Dodgen Loop. Ms. Speer reviewed some of the other allowed uses as well as those prohibited in this zoning. She stated all standards and requirements have been met by the applicant with the exception of the Zoning. Ms. Speer stated the proposed sign is 10'6" x 36' mono pole. There were 9 notices mailed out to the surrounding property owners, with none returned in favor, and 2 returned in opposition due to visibility. Ms. Speer stated staff is recommending approval of the request as presented as it complies with the Future Land Use Plan and the proposed zoning will eliminate a non-conforming use of the subject property providing appropriate zoning designation for the ministorage warehouses currently located on the subject tract. The Planning and Zoning Commission heard this case at their February 19, 2013 meeting and recommends approval 6/0.

8. 2013-4581: FIRST READING - PUBLIC HEARING: Consider adopting an ordinance designating a tract of land consisting of approximately 29.822 acres located at the southeast corner of north Loop 363 and I-35 as City of Temple Tax Abatement Reinvestment Zone Number Twenty-Six for commercial/industrial tax abatement.

Jonathan Graham, City Attorney, presented this item to Council. Mr. Graham stated this property included 29.822 aces located at the southeast corner of North Loop 363 and North I-35. He reviewed with Council what a tax abatement reinvestment zone is. By designation, this zone will have a 5 year life span; would allow tax abatement on increased property value; commercial or industrial tax abatements only. This is regulated by Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code. Mr. Graham stated that in order for a property to be eligible for an abatement, it must be a part of either a tax abatement zone or enterprise zone. This proposed zone meets the City's criteria for designation of a tax abatement RZ and the ordinance makes findings that designation will result in benefits to the City (employment and creation of real or personal property improvements). Other taxing entities have been notified of this reading.

Mayor Jones delcared the Public Hearing open with regards to Agenda Item 8 and asked if anyone wished to address the Council. There being no further comments, Mayor Jones declared the Public Hearing closed.

The City Council of the City of Temple, Texas conducted a Special Meeting on Thursday, March 21, 2013, at 3:30 PM, at the Municipal Building, 2 North Main Street, in the 3rd Floor Conference Room.

#### Present:

1. Discuss, as may be needed, Regular Meeting agenda items for the meeting posted for Thursday, March 21, 2013.

Regular Agenda Item #7 - rezone for use of billboard (Lamar Advertising).

Beverly Zendt, Interim Planning Director gave a brief overview to the Council. She also provided a few additional drawings provided by Lamar Advertising. Ms. Zendt stated the request is for commercial zoning for the use of a billboard.

Mayor Jones inquired on the zoning for the property just opposite of ministorage.

Ms. Zendt stated it is LI.

Ms. Lange, Lamar Advertising stated the proposed sign will be 10'6" x 36' mono pole, with at 60' Overall Height from the ground. The sign will clear the building top by 29'. She also stated that sign will not obstruct the visibility from the opposing property.

Councilmember Morales inquired on the type of sign being proposed?

Ms. Lange stated it is static billboard. A digital board will require permitting from the State and the City.

Councilmember Schneider stated Mr. Neimeier's concern was the type of sign; and didn't want a flashing digital billboard.

Mayor Pro Tem Dunn stated he would like to give both parties the opportunity to speak and is comfortable with tabling.

Mayor Jones thanked Ms. Lange for the additional drawings, as this gives a

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better picutre for relation of the sign.

At this time Mayor Jones stated the Council would receive the presentation from Mr. Littlefield (item #2).

#### 2. Receive an I-35 project overview and update from TxDOT.

Mr. Bobby Littlefield, Waco District Engineer for TxDOT gave a brief overview related to the projects on I-35. Sections witin Bell County were discussed. Mr. Littlefield stated this is a \$2 billion dollar corridor. He added some of the sections have been completed but others have a completion date as late as summer 2016. Section 2B is the largest project in the history of the Waco District at \$241 million dollars; this is the section from North Loop 363 to Midway Drive and was awared to James Construction.

Mr. Littlefield also commented on the ROW acquired for the IH-35 project. He stated there are 144 parcels needed with 113 acquired. Total dollars spent to dated for ROW is \$46,712,108.47 and is estimated to increase to \$64 million.

Mr. Blackburn inquired on traffic impacts and interruptions.

Mr. Littlefield stated they are still working on the CPM Schedule for the sequence of work and would know more after the 1st of April.

Mayor Jones asked if work would be phased.

Mr. Littlefield stated yes; with plans to start on the North section first.

Mayor Jones stated at this time the Council would go back to item 1 and discuss Item 9 on the Regular Agenda.

Belinda Mattke, Director of Purchasing, presented this item to Council. She stated the FY2013 adopted budget allowed for the purchase of 13 vehicles, excluding patrol cars totaling \$349,407. Bids were opened on February 19th with 9 independent bids for 14 vehicles; and 4 vendors to include Caldwell County Ford, Johnson Brothers Ford II, Ltd, Randall Reed's Prestige Ford, and Reliable Chevrolet. Item 6(D) on the Consent Agenda recommended the purchase of 9 vehicles using five independent bids where Local Preference did not apply; leaving 4 bids which Local Preference implications. Ms. Mattke reviewed with the Council, the City's Local Preference Policy. Ms. Mattke advised Council that Staff was recommending the low bidder at this time for cost of \$308,640. If they chose to go with the Local Preference Option the cost would increase by \$1,575.64 for a total of \$310,215.96.

## 3. Receive a City Council continuing education briefing on responding to constituent issues and concerns.

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Mr. Blackburn gave a brief overview of this item to the Council. He spoke on which were the most types of requests received and where they are initiated from. Mr. Blackburn also commented on the CRM (Citizen Relationship Management) Software. This was purchased in 2007 to help manage requests for resident services. It also allows staff and residents to track their requests. On average, there are 197/ per month, CRM Citizen initiated service requests for 2012. Mr. Blackburn reminded Council that we have processes in place to handle most of the regular requests for service and information. We need to be responsive and efficient in how we respond.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt a resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> The chlorine scrubber is a vital part of the water treatment plant chlorine safety scheme. The scrubber is designed to contain chlorine from escaping into the air when a leak occurs. The scrubber is designed to hold up to a 1-ton cylinder.

The annual inspection revealed several items requiring immediate repair including replacement of the caustic acid and acid wash. If the scrubber is not repaired immediately, increased risk of chlorine leak containment would result due to existing solids buildup. Any leak escaping into the air could cause the surrounding areas to be evacuated. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality requires that any facility housing chlorine cylinders maintain functional scrubbers for emergencies.

Due to the emergency nature of the project (Public Health & Safety), Siemen's Industry, Inc., was contracted to complete the work. As a result, per Local Government Code 252.022, this project is exempt from the competitive bid process. Staff authorized this work as an emergency, with Notice to Proceed issued on March 26, 2013. The project is expected to be totally complete by April 26, 2013.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding in the amount of \$37,635 is available in account 520-5122-535-6310, project #100976.

#### **DEPT./DIVISION SUBMISSION & REVIEW:**

Brynn Myers, Director of Administrative Services Belinda Mattke, Director of Purchasing

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution authorizing a Design-Build contract for construction of a compressed natural gas fueling station with ZeitEnergy LLC & Freese & Nichols Inc, of Dallas with an initial design services fee of \$100,000 and declaring an official intent to reimburse associated expenditures made prior to the issuance of tax-exempt obligations for this project.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> On December 20, 2012, the City Council initiated a natural gas alternative fuel program for the City of Temple by authorizing the purchase of fourteen (14) CNG-powered solid waste collection trucks and on January 17, 2013, the City Council authorized the use of the Design-Build project delivery method for the acquisition of services needed to construct the CNG fueling facility.

On February 14, 2013, five (5) firms submitted their qualifications for the project: (1) Transtar Energy Co dba Clean Energy of Seal Beach, CA; (2) ZeitEnergy LLC & Freese & Nichols Inc. of Dallas, TX; (3) Questar Fueling Company of Salt Lake City, UT; (4) CNG Energy Partners, LLC of Dallas, TX; and (5) Mansfield Gas Equipment Systems Corp of Ontario, CA. A committee comprised of staff from Administrative Services, Public Works, Legal, and Finance along with the City's independent engineer for this project evaluated the qualifications. It was determined that all firms were well qualified to perform the work, and as such and in accordance with the Government Code Chapter 2267, additional proposal information was requested from all firms.

After evaluating the additional proposal information received, the evaluation committee determined that ZeitEnergy LLC & Freese & Nichols Inc. offered the best value for the project to the City. The specific construction approach, location, and layout for the station will be determined during the design phase of the project, which ZeitEnergy LLC & Freese & Nichols Inc. is proposing to perform at a cost not to exceed \$100,000.

A Gross Maximum Price (GMP) will be compiled during the design phase of the project. We are anticipating that the GMP for the construction phase will be available late May 2013, at which time it will be presented to the Council for authorization to proceed. The estimated cost to construct the fueling station is \$1,300,000.

The projected timeline related to designing and constructing the CNG fueling facility is as follows:

April 2013 – May 2013- Design Phase May 2013 - Review and Acceptance of GMP June 2013 – Sept/Oct 2013- Construction Phase

**FISCAL IMPACT:** The construction cost of the CNG fueling station is estimated to be \$1,400,000 which includes \$100,000 for design. The simple payback on the capital investment for the CNG fueling station is 6.5 years assuming the following:

-Capital costs for station and other building improvements \$1,550,000

-Incremental cost of Vehicles after incentive \$ 103,509

-Purchase of 2 additional CNG vehicles per year

The fueling station, building improvements and eleven (11) CNG solid waste trucks will be financed with Limited Tax Notes. The payback for the notes will be from the combination of fuel savings recognized as a result of the use of CNG and sanitation system revenue.

The maximum term of Limited Tax Notes cannot exceed seven (7) years.

Whereas, on December 20, 2012, City Council initiated a natural gas alternative fuel program for the City of Temple by authorizing the purchase of fourteen compressed natural gas-powered solid waste collection trucks and on January 17, 2013, the City Council authorized the use of the Design-Build project delivery method for the acquisition of services needed to construct the CNG fueling facility;

Whereas, on February 14, 2013, five firms submitted their qualifications for the project and a committee comprised of staff from various departments, evaluated the qualifications – all firms were qualified to perform the work and in accordance with the Government Code Chapter 2267, additional proposal information was requested from all firms:

Whereas, the evaluation committee determined that ZeitEnergy, LLC and Freese & Nichols, Inc. of Dallas, Texas offered the best value for the project and is proposing to perform the design work at a cost not to exceed \$100,000;

Whereas, Local Government Code §252.021 specifies that before a municipality enters into a contract that requires an expenditure of more than \$50,000, the municipality must comply with the competitive sealed bidding process – however, the governing body of a municipality may determine that an alternative procurement method (Design-Build contract) may provide the best value for the municipality;

Whereas, the City of Temple anticipates the issuance of one or more series of obligations, the interest on which will be excludable from gross income under Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, in order to finance all or a portion of this project;

**Whereas**, certain expenditures relating to the Project will be paid prior to the issuance of the Obligations and the City hereby certifies that such expenditures have not been made prior to the date of passage of this Resolution;

**Whereas**, upon issuance of the Obligations, the City desires to reimburse these prior expenditures with proceeds of the Obligations;

Whereas, Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations provides that an expenditure on the Project may not be reimbursed from Obligation proceeds unless, along with other requirements, the City declares official intent to reimburse the expenditure prior to the date that the expenditure to be reimbursed was paid; and

**Whereas**, the City Council has considered the matter and deems it in the public interest to authorize this action.

Now, Therefore, be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Temple, Texas, That:

<u>Part 1:</u> The City Council authorizes the City Manager, or his designee, to execute a Design-Build contract with ZeitEnergy, LLC and Freese & Nichols, Inc., of Dallas Texas, after approval as to form by the City Attorney, for construction of a compressed natural gas (CNG) fueling station with an initial design service fee not to exceed \$100,000.

<u>Part 2:</u> This Resolution is a declaration of official intent under Section 1.150.2 of the Treasury Regulations by the City that it reasonably expects to reimburse the expenditures described in Part 1 with proceeds of debt to be incurred by the City, such debt to be issued on or before eighteen (18) months after the date of (i) the date the first expenditure is paid; or (ii) the date on which the property is placed in service, but in no event three years after the first expenditure is paid.

<u>Part 3:</u> It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Resolution is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act.

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution authorizing the following items with National Signs, LLC of Houston related to the downtown signage:

- 1. A construction contract in the amount of \$434,290 for kiosk, directional, parking, and informational signage for the downtown area, which includes the base bid and add alternates A, B, C, D, and E; and
- 2. A deductive change order in the amount of \$32,500 that reduces the scope of services in the base bid making the revised contract value \$401,790.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> This project will result in the construction and installation of a high quality, attractive signage system in the downtown. The signage will direct residents and visitors to, and around, the downtown area of Temple. <u>ITEM SUMMARY</u>: Included in the Reinvestment Zone's Project Plan is a project to redevelop the block north of the Santa Fe Railroad & Heritage Museum, currently occupied by the former Police Facility, the former Municipal Court, and the Police Special Investigations Unit. A fourth building is recommended for consideration as an add alternate to this contract if the City takes possession of the property within the necessary timeline.

On March 26, 2013, competitive sealed bids were opened for the demolition services. As shown on the attached Bid Tabulation five (5) bids were received. The low bidder is Total Demolition, Inc. of Elm Mott, Texas. Staff recommends award of these demolitions to the lowest bidder.

Asbestos abatement work is currently underway in the former Police and Municipal Court building and is anticipated to be completed in April. Demolition is anticipated to begin after the asbestos abatement work is complete.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding in the amount of \$250,000 is designated in the Reinvestment Zone account 795-9500-531-2631 for demolition activities related to this project.

#### **DEPT./DIVISION SUBMISSION & REVIEW:**

**ITEM DESCRIPTION:** Consider adopting a resolution authorizing a professional services agreement with Kasberg, Patrick & Associates, LP to design, bid, and provide construction phase services for a rail safety zone, per the report KPA was previously contracted to develop, in an amount not to exceed \$98,000.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

ITEM SUMMARY: On March 3, 2011, the City Council approved execution of a contract with KPA to develop options and alternatives to create a downtown rail safety zone, allowing locomotive traffic to operate without the use of horns. The completed report (attached) outlines recommended procedures for creation of the safety zone to prohibit traffic from traversing existing crossings of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad at South 1<sup>st</sup> Street, South Main Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Drive during rail traffic. Closure of the South 1<sup>st</sup> Street crossing and construction of Supplemental Safety Measures at the South Main Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Drive crossings are improvements associated with establishing the safety zone. A map of the project locations is attached.

On October 18, 2012, Council resolved to direct Staff to proceed with implementation of the Downtown Rail Safety Zone Report. This professional services contract is revised to include an additional \$11,000 of landscaping design. It will provide for preparation of design documents, bidding, construction administration, and on-site representation during construction. Final design will be completed within 120 calendar days after the notice to proceed. Consultant services recommended under this resolution include the following tasks and costs:



#### **INTRODUCTION**

#### A. PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

The purpose of the study is to determine the feasibility of creating a safety zone within the downtown area of Temple, Texas and to develop estimated costs for the creation of the safety zone. If feasible, the safety zone will be created by the development of a quiet zone in downtown Temple. A quiet zone is a section of rail line that contains one or more consecutive public crossings at which locomotive horns are not routinely sounded.

#### **B. SCOPE OF THE STUDY**

In general, the scope of the study includes the review of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad (BNSF) crossings located at First Street, Main Street and Martin Luther King Drive (see the location map on the next page) for the possibility of creating a safety zone through the development of a quiet zone within the downtown district. The creation of the safety zone will be reviewed in conjunction with Federal Rail Administration (FRA) regulations. The Federal Rail Administration Train Horn Rule (49 CFR Part 222) requires the sounding of locomotive train horns on approach and entry of public road-rail grade crossings. The creation of a quiet zone allows communities to silence train horns by meeting the requirements set forth by the FRA.

#### DEVELOPMENT OF FRA QUIET ZONE

#### A. PRE-RULE QUIET ZONE AND PRE-RULE PARTIAL QUIET ZONES

The first step in the creation of a quiet zone is determining if the crossings that are desired to be in a quiet zone qualify under the Pre-Rule Quiet Zones. In order to determine if the crossings will qualify under the Pre-Rule Quiet Zones the following must be accomplished:

- 1. Identify all the crossings to be included as part of the proposed quiet zone.
- 2. Check whether each crossing qualifies as a pre-rule crossing (horns not sounding on October 9, 1996 and December 18, 2003 because of state/local law or community agreement with the railroads). If all crossings do not qualify as pre-rule crossings, then the proposed quiet zone does not qualify as a Pre-Rule Quiet Zone, and the creation of a new quiet zone should be explored.
- 3. Determine whether any crossings are desired to be eliminated from the proposed quiet zone. The length of a Pre-Rule Quiet Zone may continue unchanged from that which existed on October 9, 1996. If, however, a crossing is to be eliminated, the quiet zone must be at least ½ mile in length along the railroad tracks.
- 4. A quiet zone may include highway-rail grade crossings on a segment of rail line crossing more than one political jurisdiction, or there may be roads within a particular area that are the responsibility of different entities (state or county roads within a town, for example). If the selected crossings are the responsibility of more than one entity, obtain the cooperation of all relevant jurisdictions.
- 5. Update the USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Form to reflect conditions at each public and private crossing; this update should be complete, accurate, and be dated within 6 months prior to the quiet zone implementation.
- 6. If each public crossing in the proposed quiet zone is equipped with one or more Supplementary Safety Measures (SSMs) as defined in Appendix A of the Rule, the quiet zone qualifies for automatic approval. To complete the process of creating the quiet zone, notify the parties listed in rule section 222.43 by December 18, 2004. Supplemental Safety Measures are engineering improvements, which when installed at a crossing within a quiet zone, would reduce the risk of a collision at the crossing.
- 7. If every public crossing is not equipped with at least one SSM, then the quiet zone can automatically qualify by comparing its Quiet Zone Risk Index (QZRI) with the Nationwide Significant Risk Threshold (NSRT). However, these quiet zones are subject to annual review by the Federal Rail Administration. The Quiet Zone Risk Index is the average risk index for all public crossings in a proposed quiet zone taking into consideration the increased risk caused by the absence of train horns and any decrease in risk attributable to installed Supplemental Safety Measures or Alternative Safety Measures. The Nationwide Significant Risk Threshold is the average risk index of all public, gated crossings in the nation at which train horns sound.

- 8. Using the Federal Rail Administration's Quiet Zone Calculator determine whether the QZRI of the proposed quiet zone is less than or equal to the NSRT. If the QZRI is less than or equal to the NSRT, the quiet zone qualifies for automatic approval.
- 9. If the QZRI is greater than the NSRT, use the Federal Rail Administration's Quiet Zone Calculator to check whether it is less than twice the NSRT. If the QZRI is more than twice the NSRT, the quiet zone cannot qualify for automatic approval.
- 10. If the QZRI is greater than the NSRT, but less than twice the NSRT, determine whether any of the public crossings have experienced a "relevant collision" on or after December 18, 1998. If there have not been any "relevant collisions" at any public crossing since December 18, 1998, the quiet zone qualifies for automatic approval.
- 11. If the QZRI is greater than the NSRT, but less than twice the NSRT, and there has been a "relevant collision" at a public crossing within the proposed quiet zone, the quiet zone cannot qualify for automatic approval. For information on how to proceed, see Section II, Pre-Rule Quiet Zones Not Qualified for Automatic Approval.

After reviewing the criteria outlined in Items 1-11 listed above, it has been determined that the streets identified in this study do not meet the criteria for automatic approval.

# B. CREATING A NEW QUIET ZONE OR NEW PARTIAL QUIET ZONE USING SUPPLEMENTAL SAFETY MEASURES

Since the crossings identified in this study do not meet the requirements for automatic approval, a new quiet zone must be created in order to provide a safety zone that will allow rail traffic to travel safely in the downtown area without the use of train horns. In order to achieve this, the following must be reviewed and implemented:

- 1. Select the crossings to be included in the new quiet zone.
- 2. A quiet zone may include highway-rail grade crossings on a segment of rail line crossing more than one political jurisdiction, or there may be roads within a particular area that are the responsibility of different entities (state or county roads within a town, for example). If the selected crossings are the responsibility of more than one entity, obtain the cooperation of all relevant jurisdictions.
- 3. A new quiet zone must be at least ½ mile in length along the railroad tracks.
- 4. A new quiet zone must have, at a minimum, flashing lights and gates in place at each public crossing. These must be equipped with constant warning time devices where reasonably practical, and power out indicators. Any necessary upgrades must be completed before calculating risk for the quiet zone. The crossings at Martin Luther King Drive and Main Street have the minimum infrastructure in place for utilizing SSMs without additional construction by BNSF. First Street does not have the infrastructure in place.
- 5. Are there any private crossings within the proposed Quiet Zone? If any private crossings allow access to the public or provide access to active industrial or commercial sites, a diagnostic team review of those crossings must be conducted. Following the diagnostic review, the diagnostic team's recommendations concerning those crossings must be complied with. For the creation of this safety zone there are not any private crossings.
- 6. Update the USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Form to reflect conditions at each public and private crossing; this update should be complete, accurate, and dated within 6 months prior to the quiet zone implementation. For new quiet zones, the baseline conditions for calculating risk require that the minimum required traffic control devices are in place. This first Inventory update, therefore, must be completed after the gates, lights, and signs are in place, but before the SSMs and other measures are implemented.
- 7. Using the FRA's Quiet Zone Calculator, a web-based tool, determine whether the Quiet Zone Risk Index (QZRI) of the proposed quiet zone is less than or equal to the Nationwide Significant Risk Threshold (NSRT). If the QZRI is less than or equal to the NSRT, the quiet zone can be established through public authority designation by completing the following steps:
  - a. Install required signage at each crossing.
  - b. Notify the parties listed in the rule.

Note: Quiet zones established by comparison to the NSRT are subject to annual FRA review.

Note: Periodic updates, including updated USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Forms, must be submitted to the FRA every 2½-3 years.

- 8. The step described above involves qualifying a quiet zone without implementing any Supplementary Safety Measures (SSMs) or Alternative Safety Measures (ASMs). If the FRA's Quiet Zone Calculator indicates that the proposed quiet zone will not qualify on that basis, then any required measures shall be installed. To qualify for Public Authority Designation, the following requirements shall be met: implement SSMs, build grade separations, close crossings, or install wayside horns.
- 9. If every public crossing in the proposed quiet zone is equipped with one or more SSMs, the quiet zone can be established through public authority designation by completing the following steps:
  - a. Install required signage at each crossing.
  - b. Update the National Grade Crossing Inventory to reflect current conditions at each public and private crossing within the Quiet Zone.
  - c. Notify the parties listed in the rule.

Note: Periodic updates, including updated USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Forms, must be submitted to the FRA every 4½-5 years.

- 10. If every public crossing is not equipped with an SSM, use the FRA's Quiet Zone Calculator to determine whether enough SSMs have been implemented to reduce the QZRI to the level of risk that would exist if the train horns were still sounded (RIWH). If the QZRI is less than or equal to the RIWH, the quiet zone can be established through public authority designation by completing the following steps: RIWH is the Risk Index with Horns. The is the level of risk as determined by at grade rail crossings with train horns sounding.
  - a. Install required signage at each crossing.
  - b. Update the National Grade Crossing Inventory to reflect current conditions at each public and private crossing within the quiet zone.
  - c. Notify the parties listed in the rule.

Note: Periodic updates, including updated USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Forms, must be submitted to FRA every  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -3 years.

11. Use the FRA's Quiet Zone Calculator to determine whether enough SSMs have been implemented to reduce the QZRI to the Nationwide Significant Risk Threshold (NSRT).

If the QZRI is less than or equal to the current NSRT, the quiet zone can be established through public authority designation by completing the following steps:

- a. Install required signage at each crossing.
- b. Update the National Grade Crossing Inventory to reflect current conditions at each public and private crossing within the quiet zone.
- c. Notify the parties listed in the rule.

Note: Quiet zones established by comparison to the NSRT are subject to annual FRA review.

Note: Periodic updates, including updated USDOT Grade Crossing Inventory Forms, must be submitted to the FRA every 2½-3 years.

For the Temple Downtown Area Supplemental Safety Measures (SSMs) will be required in order to have a railroad crossing within a quiet zone. Approved Supplemental Safety Measures by the Federal Rail Administration are:

- Four quadrant gates
- Medians or channelization devices at gated crossings
- Temporary closure (i.e. nighttime closure)

The four quadrant gates are by far the easiest solution for the creation of quiet zones with at grade crossings. They are the most expensive option as well with each intersection costing as much as \$500,000. These SSMs require intense work by the BNSF which will drive up costs for the City of Temple. For this reason it is not feasible to create the safety zone in the downtown area utilizing four quadrant gates.

One way streets and temporary closures are also an option that is not feasible. Traffic in the downtown area of Temple requires directional (two-way) traffic due to the layout of the area. As a result, these options are not practicable or feasible for downtown Temple.

Medians for Main Street and Martin Luther King Drive present a viable SSM for the creation of a quiet zone. Infrastructure is currently in place within the BNSF rail line to allow the median to function with the gate system, although the gates at Martin Luther King Drive will need to be investigated for coverage by a proposed median. First Street does not have the required constant warning devices in place to implement SSMs without construction efforts from the BNSF. For this reason, along with pedestrian traffic near this crossing, we will explore closing this rail crossing.

# C. <u>CITY OF TEMPLE DOWNTOWN AREA STREETS CONSIDERED FOR NEW QUIET ZONE</u>

#### 1. Martin Luther King Drive

The BNSF Railroad crosses Martin Luther King Drive (MLK) east of their terminal yard. MLK is a four lane roadway at this location with existing gates that are connected to HXP-1 constant warning circuitry. This crossing is equipped with power-out light indicators on the crossing houses. This location is defined on the U.S. Department of Transportation Grade Crossing Inventory as DOT Number 022964N located at Rail Road Mile Post 217.69. These elements qualify this at grade crossing to meet the minimum requirements for active warning devices, thus allowing Supplemental Safety Measures (SSM) to be installed without additional construction to the BNSF mainline. This intersection will need to have medians constructed as a SSM to reduce the Quiet Zone Risk Index and qualify this intersection to be included in the proposed safety zone. Please see Page 11 for the Martin Luther King Drive exhibit.

#### 2. Main Street

The Main Street crossing of the BNSF railroad occurs in the downtown area of Temple directly east of the connection to the BNSF terminal yard. It is a two lane roadway that has an abandoned rail crossing directly south of the BNSF mainline crossing. This crossing is equipped with gates connected to HXP-1 constant warning circuitry and power-out light indicators on the crossing houses. This location is defined on the U.S. Department of Transportation Grade Crossing Inventory as DOT Number 022964N located at Rail Road Mile Post 217.69. These elements qualify this at grade crossing to meet the minimum requirements for active warning devices, thus allowing Supplemental Safety Measures (SSM) to be installed without additional construction to the BNSF mainline. This intersection will need to have medians constructed as an SSM to reduce the Quiet Zone Risk Index and qualify this intersection to be included in the proposed safety zone. Please see Page 12 for the Main Street Exhibit.

#### 3. First Street

First Street is located directly west of Main Street. Currently the rail crossing does not have the constant warning devices in place to develop SSMs to allow this intersection to qualify in the safety zone with out construction efforts from BNSF. The proximity requires that this crossing be included in the quiet zone or be eliminated. First Street is located adjacent to the Farmers Market and Santa Fe Gardens in the downtown area of Temple. These attractions create heavy pedestrian traffic for First Street at this location. The best scenario is to close this crossing. BNSF will have to remove the active warning devices and crossing panels from the track for the closing to occur. The cost for removing these items will be the responsibility of the BNSF and there will not be any cost for these efforts to the City of Temple. There are incentives available from BNSF for closing existing at grade rail crossings. The amount of the incentive has been determined to be \$17,500 by the BNSF Closure Review Committee. This has been submitted to the BNSF and will expire on January 1, 2012. It is anticipated that the amount will remain the same for future submittals. The Texas Department of Transportation can also offer

\$7,500 for safety improvements at this intersection. These incentives allow a total of \$25,000 to be utilized for this project. Please See Page 13

Cost estimates for each crossing have been developed and are included in this report. All rail crossings must be completed in order to create the safety zone due to the location of the crossings. The total cost for the creation of the safety zone is \$450,000.

At the request of the City of Temple Reinvestment Zone #1 (TRZ), we are submitting this proposal for the above referenced project. This project will design the downtown rail safety zones by developing a road crossing closure and construction of Supplemental Safety Measures (SSMs). (See attached exhibit). The final product will be construction ready plans, specifications and estimates. Also included in the project are bidding, construction administration and on site representation.

This project will design, prepare specifications, develop construction estimates, bid the project, administer construction administration and provide on-site representation for the project. Meetings and discussions with City of Temple Staff, The Temple Reinvestment Zone #1, and The Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad (BNSF) are included in the work. Included in the scope of the project will be surveying, landscape architecture design, horizontal roadway design, vertical roadway design, design of roadway closure at South 1<sup>st</sup> Street, development of construction plans, development of specifications, bidding documents, construction administration and on site representation. We will coordinate this project with the City of Temple, Temple Reinvestment Zone, and BNSF.

This project will be developed in accordance with the Temple Reinvestment Zone 2022 Master Plan and the Downtown Rail Safety Zone Study completed in October 2011. It will include intense coordination with the BNSF to develop the Safety Zone. The Safety Zone will include elements to prohibit traffic from traversing the existing crossings of the BNSF Railroad at South 1st Street, South Main Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Drive during BNSF rail traffic at these locations. By accomplishing this, the intersections will qualify for a quiet zone eliminating the need for locomotives to regularly sound their horn prior to traversing these crossings. Accomplishment of the Safety Zone will be achieved by closing South 1st Street and providing SSMs at the crossings of South Main Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Drive. There may be a need to close or prohibit driveway access adjacent to the crossings to develop the Safety Zone. Submittals to BNSF of the final construction documents will be required and any comments or input will be incorporated into the final construction plans. We will develop construction plans and specifications to be advertised

and bid through the City of Temple Purchasing Department. Official bid documents will be certified and tabulated to determine the low bidder. Construction phase services will also be supplied under this contract and include Construction Administration and On Site Representation. We will keep City Staff, members of the TRZ and BNSF included in the entire project process. Final design is anticipated to be complete within one hundred and twenty calendar days after the notice to proceed and coordination with BNSF is anticipated to be completed within two hundred and forty calendar days after completion of the design. This anticipates responsive efforts from the BNSF. If the BNSF is not responsive these dates may be delayed. Our Preliminary Opinion of Probable Cost is \$450,000.

- Design of enhancements for the closing of South 1st Street.

- Meetings with City of Temple Staff, the Temple Reinvestment Zone and BNSF.
- Project plans and specifications construction of the Project.

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution authorizing a professional services agreement with Clark & Fuller, PLLC for professional services required to design the reconstruction of residential streets within the Western Hills subdivision in an amount not to exceed \$642,074.28.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> The City of Temple has adopted a Transportation Capital Improvement Plan (TCIP) in which some roads within the Western Hills subdivision have been identified for reconstruction. Some residential streets within Western Hills have deteriorated to the point of significantly reduced drivability. Poor underlying soils have exhibited substantial subsidence and heave, and the roadways now require reconstruction. The scope of work for this contract includes design of road reconstruction for Geronimo Trail and portions of Antelope, Chisholm, and Deer Trails. Utility relocations and replacements are included in the fees. It is anticipated that no additional ROW will be required.

In December of last year, the City executed a professional services agreement in the amount of \$17,050 to conduct a geotechnical investigation and preliminary street cross section design. Clark & Fuller's preliminary design recommends use of a concrete pavement cross section to minimize adverse impacts of the expansive soil subgrade. This section will also be durable and rigid, inhibiting groundwater penetration which also contributes to deteriorating pavements.

Professional fees related to reconstruction of the road and storm sewer for design through contract phases are \$402,120.74. Professional fees related to water and sanitary sewer relocation and replacement for design through construction phases are \$239,953.54. The Engineer's preliminary Opinions of Probable Cost for construction are \$3,854,634 for the road and storm sewer and \$1,803,571 for the water and sanitary sewer. Design will be completed within 240 calendar days. Consultant services recommended under this resolution include the following tasks and costs:

The timeline for design of this project is approximately 240 days, with project bidding and construction of utilities to occur during the winter of 2014. Roadway reconstruction will be properly coordinated and sequenced following completion of underground utility work.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funding in the amount of \$402,121 is available in account # 365-3400-531-6858, project #100967to fund the professional services related to the reconstruction of the road and storm sewer design. This project was approved as part of the 2013 TCIP.

A budget adjustment is presented for Council's approval appropriating \$239,954 of Unreserved Water & Sewer Retained Earnings to account # 520-5900-535-6521, project #100967 to fund the professional services agreement related to the water and sewer relocation.


This letter is written to briefly discuss the Western Hills Roadway and Utility Replacement Project and give our design recommendations.

The city has decided to reconstruct approx. 6,250 linear feet of existing streets of flexible pavement in the Western Hills subdivision that were originally built in the 1970's. The streets have been over-laid, patched, and otherwise repaired since the original construction. Performance problems are believed due substantially to the highly expansive clay subgrade that exists under all but a small portion of the streets studied. In addition to rebuilding streets that are adequate for supporting the typical Temple street design loads, the city desires to minimize the adverse impacts of the expansive soil subgrade. Three design options are proposed which, in our opinion, offer low, moderate, and high risk of undesirable performance. The lowest risk design recommends removing and replacing the existing fat clay to 10 feet with inert material. This is considered impractical. The moderate risk design recommends 6 inches of reinforced concrete pavement over 6 inches of cement treated base, over 1 foot of select fill. (Our estimates using this pavement section for reconstruction, including storm sewer, will cost approx. \$617.00 per linear foot.) The highest risk design of these 3 options involves reconstructing the existing streets with 2 inches of hot mix asphaltic concrete (HMAC) over 10 inches of cement treated base. (Our estimates using this pavement section for reconstruction, including new storm sewer, will cost approx. \$434.00 per linear foot.)

We are recommending that the City of Temple remove the existing streets in their entirety and reconstruct using the Moderate Risk Pavement Section. We have observed similar pavement sections, constructed within other cities, performing well under very similar soil and geologic conditions. The moderate risk pavement section reduces some of the risk due to the highly expansive soils and also provides a durable and rigid pavement section. In addition, the cement treated base material will inhibit groundwater penetration. We also recommend using root barriers, adjacent to existing encroaching trees, to inhibit root growth and penetration into the new pavement sections. To further reduce groundwater penetration, we are recommending installing new French drains adjacent to areas where the existing topography is flat and allows groundwater to stand freely for long durations of time.









2013 WESTERN HILLS ROADWAY AND UTILITY REPLACEMENT PROJECT

We would like to thank the City of Temple for the opportunity to submit a preliminary opinion of probable cost and engineering fee proposal for the City of Temple - 2013 Western Hills Roadway and Utility Replacement Project. (Please refer to attached maps and documents for further information).

This project will consist of approximately 6,250 linear feet of existing roadway demolition and replacement, 1,900 linear feet of new storm sewer reconstruction, approximately 16 new storm sewer curb inlets, 1800 linear feet of new 12" Sanitary Sewer Main, 1800 linear feet of new 8" Sanitary Sewer Main, and 6485 linear feet of new Water Main construction to replace existing utility mains that are beginning to fail. **Whereas**, staff recommends authorizing a professional services agreement with Clark & Fuller, PLLC, for services required to design the reconstruction of residential streets within the Western Hills subdivision, in an amount not to exceed \$642,074.28 which will be broken down as follows:

- Professional fees related to reconstruction of the road and storm sewer for design through contract phases - \$402,120.74;
- o Professional fees related to water and sanitary sewer relocation and replacement for design through construction phases \$239,953.54;
- o Engineer's preliminary Opinions of Probable Cost for construction for road and storm sewer \$3,854,634;
- Engineer's preliminary Opinions of Probable Cost for construction for water and sanitary sewer - \$1,803,571;

#### **DEPT./DIVISION SUBMISSION & REVIEW:**

Alan DeLoera, Information Technology Director

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution authorizing the purchase of the fourth year of a Microsoft Software Enterprise Agreement with Dell Corporation of Round Rock, Texas, utilizing DIR Contract DIR-SDD-1014 in the amount of \$83,692.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> The City of Temple currently uses Microsoft for all of our office applications as well as database servers throughout the City. The software we currently use include Microsoft Word, Powerpoint, Excel, Sharepoint, Outlook, and Publisher as well as Enterprise solutions for SQL Server, Exchange Server, Operating systems and enterprise server software.

After reviewing some of the Volume Licensing programs that were presented, we decided to request a Microsoft Enterprise Agreement that covers Microsoft Office Professional and the Microsoft Core Client Access License (CAL) Suite—including the Windows Server® 2012 operating system, Microsoft Exchange Server, Microsoft Systems Management Server, and Microsoft Office SharePoint® Portal Server—for all of the City computers. The agreement also covers a wide variety of additional technologies including Windows Server, Exchange Server, Internet Security and Acceleration Server, SQL Server™, and Microsoft Operations Manager licenses for 25 servers. This year due to more storage and security issues we are upgrading to the Microsoft System Center Manager which will help us to better manage these issues but it will also increase our cost.

This is the fourth year of the City's Enterprise Agreement and through the Enterprise Agreement, we are able to more effectively standardize software across all desktops and take advantage of many of the included Software Assurance benefits, including New Version Rights, Desktop Deployment Planning Services, Training Vouchers, Microsoft eLearning, Home Use Program, 24x7 Problem Resolution Support, a TechNet Plus subscription, and Extended Hotfix's.

Prior to 2010, it was the Information Technology Department's practice of purchasing new licenses every 3 to 4 years through a select agreement program because we felt the Enterprise Agreement was more expensive over the 3 to 4 year period, but the pricing now has reversed in the sense that it is less costly to go through a yearly Enterprise Agreement. We also felt that the cycle for software upgrades by Microsoft was about every 3 to 4 years but that has changed in the past 4 years in that

software upgrades are on a more frequent basis. This also helps solve a problem in that we would be on the same Enterprise Agreement with many other State and local agencies that currently upgrade their software on a more frequent basis.

If we were to purchase based on the select agreement today we would have to spend about \$350,000 for all of our licensing needs on servers and the desktops and in another 3 years we would spend another \$350,000 to upgrade again. With the Enterprise Agreement we spent \$100,905.92 per year in 2010, 2011 and 2012, we are proposing to spend approximately \$\$83,692 in 2013, and expect to spend \$83,692 per year for 2014 and 2015 for a six year cost of approximately \$556,000 versus \$700,000 for the same six year period if we purchased the software outright.

Originally we projected spending \$61,000 for years 2013 thru 2015 but due to more storage requirements, use of virtualization and security issues, we are upgrading to the Microsoft System Center Manager which will help us to better manage these issues. This in turn increases our six year cost to \$556,000 from our original projection of \$489,000 but still is much better than purchasing the software outright for \$700,000 over a 6 year period.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** A budget adjustment is presented for Council's approval appropriating \$83,692 of General Fund Technology funds to account 351-1900-519-6221, project 100973 for the purchase of software with Dell Corporation. This is the second year of a six year Enterprise Agreement.



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING SCHOOL CROSSWALKS AND SETTING SPEED LIMITS WITHIN SCHOOL ZONES TO CONFORM TO SCHOOL SCHEDULES; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN OPEN MEETINGS CLAUSE.

Whereas, in January of 2012, the City adopted an ordinance establishing school crosswalks and setting speed limits within school zones as agreed upon by the City, Temple Independent School District ("TISD") and Belton Independent School District ("BISD");

**Whereas,** TISD has requested a new school zone be established on South 25<sup>th</sup> Street from West Avenue R just south of West Avenue M for Travis Middle School – reducing the speed limit from 30 mph to 20 mph from the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. on school days;

**Whereas,** TISD is constructing a new addition to the Travis Middle School campus which will become the main parent entrance to the school on South 25<sup>th</sup> Street; and

Whereas, the City Council has considered the matter and deems it in the public interest to establish this school zone for the benefit of the citizens for the promotion of the public health, welfare, and safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPLE, TEXAS:

<u>Part 1:</u> The City Council finds that a school zone shall be established on South 25<sup>th</sup> Street from West Avenue R just south of West Avenue M for Travis Middle School – reducing the speed limit from 30 mph to 20 mph from the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. on school days, more fully shown on Exhibit A which is attached hereto and made a part hereof for all purposes.

Part 2: It shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle, bicycle, or other vehicle of any kind, whether or not motor powered, on that portion of the roadways described above under the conditions described herein, at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the circumstances then existing, but any speed in excess of the reasonable and prudent prima facie maximum speed limits as set forth in Part 1 hereof shall be prima facie evidence that such speed is not reasonable or prudent and that it is unlawful.

- **Part 3:** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.
- <u>Part 4:</u> If any provision of this ordinance or the application of any provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or

applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Part 5: This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Temple, Texas, and it is accordingly so ordained.

Part 6: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed was open to the public as required and that public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act.

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution authorizing an interlocal agreement with Bell County for use of the County's software and fiber optic network to process and maintain records regarding early voting, in the amount of \$1,370.

**STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt resolution as presented in item description.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> In 2002, an agreement was entered into with Bell County for the City to use the County's early voting system. This system includes computer software developed by the County to process and maintain records regarding early voting, as well as the County's fiber optic network to access the computer programs and voter registration data throughout the year. In 2013 Bell County purchased new software VOTEK for voter registration database. The City's cost will be increase by \$170 for the addition technical support required from Bell County. This is calculated at \$85 per hour/2 hours annually.

This system will be used in all City elections and is the same system used in all elections conducted by Bell County. The County continues to provide staff training and modifications to the programs and reports to meet our needs for each election. Utilization of this automated system saves time for both employees and voters by streamlining the early voting process. It also allows us to maintain an electronic database of voters for each election.

We recommend approval of this interlocal agreement with Bell County for a period of one year, at a cost of \$1,370.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Funds are available in 110-1400-511-2517 for this contract in the amount of \$1.370.

<u>ITEM DESCRIPTION:</u> Consider adopting a resolution declaring the candidate for the May 11, 2013 District 4 City Councilmember as unopposed and elected to office, thereby canceling the May 11, 2013 City general election for District 4 only.

**ITEM SUMMARY:** The Election Code permits the cancellation of an election under certain circumstances. This is the fourth opportunity the City of Temple has had to cancel an election.

In order to cancel an election in the City, the City Secretary must certify in writing to the City Council that only one candidate's name is to appear on the ballot for the election in a particular district; that no write-in candidates have filed to be placed on the list of write-in candidates for this place; and that no proposition is to appear on the ballot. These certifications have been made on the attached *Certification of Unopposed Candidates* regarding the District 4 Councilmember election.

Since there is only one candidate for District 4 Councilmember, incumbent, Russell T. Schneider, the Council can declare the unopposed candidates for District 4 elected to office, thereby canceling the May 11, 2014 election in Districts 4. The *Order of Cancellation*, also attached, will be posted on Election Day at these polling places. The Certificate of Election will be presented to Mr. Schneider and following the May 11<sup>th</sup> election date.

<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> The City recently completed an inventory of property owned by the City. This property inventory identified multiple properties that the City has acquired over the years thru various means, including donations and right-of-way purchases for projects. Some of the properties that the City holds are remnants of right-of-way acquisitions; some were acquired via sheriff's sales for delinquent taxes; and some were acquired for unknown reasons.

Many of these properties have little or no value to the City. In fact, many are a liability to the City as the City is responsible for maintenance of the properties. However, abutting property owners might have an interest in some of these properties if the cost to them for acquisition were either nominal or nothing.

However, the current process under state law for disposing of surplus property by a city requires appraisals and 'fair market value' to be received. This process, when applied to these particular surplus properties, does not work for disposing of them because the costs of the process typically outweigh the value of the property.

The City has asked our State Representative to file a bill (HB1472) that would amend Section 253.013 of the Local Government Code to allow the donation of certain surplus real property by certain municipalities (Temple) under certain terms and conditions. These terms and conditions include that the property may not have any improvements on it, a finding by the city that there is no 'identifiable positive benefit' to the city, that the property is not likely to provide any 'identifiable positive benefit', and the cost of maintaining the property is a substantial burden to the city.

HB 1472 would provide the City with an additional, local option process that would be beneficial in returning certain surplus properties into private ownership and lessening the costs to the taxpayers.

Once the surplus properties are no longer owned by the City, the maintenance of the properties will no longer be the City's responsibility. <u>ITEM DESCRIPTION</u> SECOND READING - Z-FY-13-10: Consider adopting an ordinance authorizing a zone change from Planned Development with specific uses of shopping center and housing development to Commercial (to permit billboard sign) on 0.52 ± acres of Creekside Planned Development Temple, Bell County, Texas according to the plat recorded in Volume 1528, Page 813, of the real property records of Bell County, Texas, located at 3602 SW H K Dodgen Loop.

<u>PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:</u> At its February 19, 2013 meeting, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted 6/0 (Commissioners Martin, Magana, and Johnson were absent) in accordance with staff recommendation to recommend approval of a zone change from Planned Development with specific uses of shopping center and housing development to Commercial.



<u>ITEM SUMMARY:</u> The applicant, Lamar Advertising, has requested a rezoning for the subject property for the purpose of relocating an off-premise sign located at 2500 North General Bruce Drive affected by the Texas Department of Transportation I-35 expansion project. The subject tract was originally platted as portion of a larger planned development project that allowed for shopping center and housing development uses. The .52 acre subject tract was subsequently subdivided out of the larger tract, both of which now serve as a location for mini-storage warehouses.

The site proposed for the new sign is currently zoned Planned Development (PD) with specific uses of shopping center and housing development. Off-premise signs are allowed in Light Industrial, Heavy Industrial, and Commercial zoning districts. The applicant has proposed rezoning the proposed site Commercial to allow for the off-premise sign and to provide appropriate zoning for a portion of the existing use of mini-storage warehouses. The purpose of the Commercial zoning district is to permit all retail and most commercial land uses including auto dealerships with complete servicing facilities, building material sales, light manufacturing and heavy machinery sales and storage. Off-premise signs are permitted in Commercial zoning district subject to the requirements and limitations identified in Article 7 of the Unified Development Code. Mini-storage warehouses are allowed in the Commercial zoning district provided that the size of each individual storage unit is limited to a maximum of 2,000 cubic feet. All the mini-storage warehouses in the subject tract provide a maximum of 400 cubic feet of storage.

City staff has maintained the position that if an existing off-premise sign on I-35 must be relocated because of the I-35 expansion, City staff will approve the sign relocation on the same site. If the existing zoning is not correct the City will consider processing a zoning change to allow compliance or a Planned Development if the straight zoning is not a positive option for the City provided that dimensional requirements, design standards and spacing requirements have all been met.

The proposed sign complies with dimensional, setback, and design standards governing off-premise signs located on HK Dodgen Loop. The proposal is for the relocation of a metal, monopole sign setback 17'- 20' from the right-of-way The height of the new sign will be no taller than 42.5'. The face of the sign will be 10.6' X 36' meeting the dimensional requirements established for signs located along HK Dodgen Loop. Section 7.5.11 of the Unified Development Code (UDC) states that signs located on HK Dodgen Loop may not be erected within 2000' of one another off-premise sign. The proposed sign will be approximately 2,700' from the nearest sign to the west and approximately 2,000 from the nearest sign to the east.

### Future Land Use and Character Plan (FLUP) (CP Map 3.1)

The future land use and character map designates the subject property as Auto-Urban Commercial. This area, according the Temple Comprehensive Plan, is appropriate for commercial uses, generally concentrated at intersections versus strip development along the major roads. The Comprehensive Plan identifies Auto-Urban Commercial and the dominant development pattern along H.K. Dodgen Loop. The plan calls for better landscaping along frontages and around and within parking areas and a build—to—line rather than large setbacks.

### Thoroughfare Plan (CP Map 5.2)

The Thoroughfare Plan designates HK Dodgen Loop as an Expressway which is appropriate for commercial and industrial development. The rezoning request is compatible with the Thoroughfare Plan.

### Availability of Public Facilities (CP Goal 4.1)

Public facilities have already been established in this area and are available at this site.

### Temple Trails Master Plan Map and Sidewalks Ordinance

SW HK Dodgen Loop has not been identified on the Trails Master Plan adopted on October 18, 2012.

<u>DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS:</u> The proposed sign and existing mini-storage warehouses comply with dimensional and setback standards for the Commercial zoning district. The proposed sign complies with all design standards identified in Section 7.5.11 of the UDC. All the mini-storage warehouses on the subject tract provide a maximum of 400 cubic feet of storage in compliance with Section 5.3.8 of the UDC. The Director of Planning and Development has permitted an Administrative Adjustment (up to 10 percent) per Section 3.12 of the Unified Development Code as the proposed spacing for the proposed off-premise sign is deficient by 19' (1%) of the required spacing requirement.








Item 2: Z-FY-13-10: Hold a public hearing to discuss and recommend action on a zone change from Planned Development with specific uses of shopping center and housing development to Commercial on 0.52 ± acres of Creekside Planned Development Temple, Bell County, Texas according to the plat recorded in Volume 1528, Page 813, of the real property records of Bell County, Texas, located at 3602 SW H K Dodgen Loop. (Applicant: Lamar Advertising)

Ms. Beverly Zendt, Assistant Planning Director, stated the applicant is Lamar Advertising on behalf of V. W. Barge. City Council will consider this matter on first reading on March 7, 2013 and second reading on March 21, 2013.

The applicant is requesting zoning from Planned Development (PD) for shopping center housing development for the purpose of an off-site premise sign. The current zoning does not permit off-premise signs. The PD dates back to 1978.

Uses on the current PD include multi-family towards the rear, a mini-storage warehouse, and professional office building.

The proposed sign will be set back 17 to 20 feet off of the right-of-way.

The Unified Development Code (UDC) Section 7.5.11 identifies standards for off-premise signs. This proposed sign meets most of the standards but falls short of the spacing requirements by approximately 15 to 18 feet. The Director of Planning and Development has approved an administrative adjustment per Section 3.1.2 of the UDC as it is within ten percent of the requirement. As billboards are only allowed in Commercial (C), Light Industrial (LI) or Heavy Industrial (HI) zoning districts, the applicant is requesting rezoning.

Surrounding uses include additional mini-storage warehouses and multi-family use to the north, PD-GR (Planned Development General Retail) retail and professional uses to the south, PD (professional office) with specific uses to the east, and LI (retail and professional office) to the west.

The Future Land Use and Character Map designate this area as Auto-Urban Commercial. According to the Comprehensive Plan Auto-Urban Commercial is appropriate for commercial uses and is the dominant pattern along H K Dodgen Loop.

The UDC states Commercial districts should permit most retail and commercial land uses and is intended to serve citywide or regional service areas and should be located along major highways and major intersections.

Prohibited uses in Commercial districts include most industrial such as asphalt, concrete batch plants, wrecking yards, refinery or chemical plants to name a few.

Nine notices were mailed out with zero notices received in favor and one notice received in opposition.

Staff recommends approval for the following reasons:

The proposed zoning is consistent with the Future Land Use Map which identifies this area as Auto-Urban Commercial;

The proposed zoning is compatible with the surrounding uses; and

The proposed zoning eliminates a non-conforming use on the subject property providing an appropriate zoning designation for the mini-storage warehouses currently located on the subject tract.

Chair Staats opened the public hearing. There being no speakers, the public hearing was closed.

The proposed plan update recommends adding triggering criteria based on water supply and time of year, maintaining the triggering criteria based on system usage, and eliminating the triggering criteria based on storage capacity.
